Upon the petition of S. S. Buckner and others George Schiller is hereby appointed justice of the peace and Bert Nation constable, both of Wallace precinct, to fill vacancy.

Repository bond of bank of Sutherland for county funds is hereby approved.

Upon petition of R. R. Lawrence and others J. S. Thrasher is hereby appointed assessor for Deer Creek to fill vacancy.
