WHEN it comes to city politics James Belton is more effusive than effective, but the lack of the latter does not seem to dampen his enthusiasm. Mr. Belton should be more definite and state just what he wants.

FRED FUNSTON, the gallant Kansan who well earned a brigadier-generalship by his good work in the Philippines, has been placed in command of the department of Colorado with headquarters at Denver.

THE republican state central committee met at Lincoln yesterday and selected Wednesday, June 18th, as the date, and Lincoln the place, of holding the state convention. Under the apportionment, Lincoln county is entitled to thirteen delegates.

THE republican members of the house have agreed to make a concession of twenty per cent from the present tariff rate on Cuban sugar. This agreement, which is a compromise, is not satisfactory to the beet sugar men nor the Cuban planters.

AND after all, it is probable that the rights provided by the recently adopted initiative and referendum will be embraced by the people of North Platte. Those who object to a twenty years' franchise to a gas company which wants two dollars a thousand feet for gas that should be furnished for one dollar and a half, want a chance to vote on the proposition. They will probably be given an opportunity.

THE conference of fusionists at Lincoln Wednesday was not the success that had been anticipated, for though 500 invitations were sent out to the members of the committees and local leaders, less than fifty responded. The conference did not result in any definite action, though it is hoped that at a future meeting of the executive committees arrangements will be made for fusion and joint conventions, in which the democrats are pretty certain to get a majority of the candidates on the state ticket.

THE Omaha Bee is insistent on the need of a special session of the legislature and gives these reasons for thus insisting. It says: "The acquittal of ex-Treasurer Meserve on the plea that as custodian of the permanent school fund he could not be held liable for pocketing interest on money deposited contrary to the provision of the constitution again emphasizes the imperative demand for constitutional revision, without which the financial affairs of the state cannot be safely conducted. The most speedy and effective way of applying the remedy is through the submission of the necessary amendments to the constitution at the coming election. To accomplish this purpose a special meeting of the legislature should be called at once."

COLONIZING NEBRASKA.

The announcement that the managers of the Union Pacific railway have perfected a plan of colonization by which they hope to bring 15,000 new settlers into this state during the coming year will be hailed with gratification by everybody interested in the development and prosperity of Nebraska.

No state in the union presents a more promising field for industrious homesteaders. There is room in Nebraska for several million more people without crowding. With only one-fourth of its area under cultivation, the grain crops of Nebraska during any fair harvest year are worth more than all the mineral wealth taken out of the earth in any one year in Colorado or California.

The corn crop of Nebraska in any good year computed at 25 cents a bushel will yield \$75,000,000, and the other cereals and grasses will market for at least \$50,000,000 more. The heaviest output of precious metals in Colorado or California never exceeded fifty million dollars in one year.

It is eminently proper for the Union Pacific to inaugurate a plan of colonization even at this late day. The greatest mistake the former owners of the Union Pacific railroad made was that they centered all their efforts on the through traffic while neglecting lamentably the local traffic which constitutes the most profitable source of the income of a well established railroad.

It must be born in mind that the larger as well as the better part of Nebraska is north of the Platte river. Had that part of the state been colonized properly the state could today have boasted half a dozen cities of from 20,000 to 50,000 population between Omaha and Cheyenne and its wealth would have been more than trebled.

Had the Union Pacific pursued the policy which the Burlington was forced to inaugurate by reason of its limitation to local traffic and dependence on the same the state census for the year 1900 would have shown a population for Nebraska of more than 2,000,000.

Now that the Union Pacific has awakened to its true interest it is to be hoped that it will exert all its energy and influence to make up for lost time. It is better late than never.—Bee.
