

REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION

A Republican County Convention for Lincoln county, Nebraska, will be held in the city of North Platte, Nebraska, on Saturday, June 7, 1902, at ten o'clock a. m. For the purpose of selecting delegates to the State Convention; delegates to the Congressional Convention, delegates to the Representative Convention. The placing in nomination a candidate for County Attorney and a candidate for the Third Commissioner District, to be voted for at the election held for said purpose on Nov. 4th, 1902, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The several precincts within said county are entitled to send to said convention one delegate at large and one for each twenty votes or major fraction thereof cast therein for the Hon. S. H. Sedgwick for supreme judge at the 1901 election, as follows:

Dr. BEGHTAL will succeed J. T. Mallalieu as superintendent of the state industrial school at Kearney.

The May apportionment of state school money will be \$1.10 per pupil, which with one exception, is the largest ever made in the state.

As the time for holding the congressional convention approaches the show of Judge Grimes receiving the nomination increases. The people of the district are becoming cognizant of the fact that he is the logical candidate.

The government crop report gives Nebraska a per centage of eighty-nine on winter wheat, which is considerably above the average and but one state—Missouri—shows a higher per centage. In this particular Nebraska is certainly all right.

In 1890 the total assessed valuation of Nebraska was ten million dollars greater than it was in 1901. This might lead some to think that the state is retrograding, but it is not, the falling off is due to the system of assessing now in vogue. One county will assess at one-fourth actual value, while in another a one-tenth basis is used.

The striking miners in the anthracite coal region of Pennsylvania, of whom there are about 160,000, are conducting themselves very peaceably. It is doubtful if this condition will continue when the men exhaust their cash or credit and hunger makes its wants known. The strike promises to be a prolonged one.

The Grand Island Independent thinks it is yet time for the republicans of the Sixth congressional district to change the place of holding their convention from Crawford to Grand Island. Crawford is certainly an out-of-the-way place for the Platte valley counties, and in case of a dead-lock the lack of accommodations will make it necessary for delegates to sleep on the prairie.

No sooner is J. Sterling Morton laid to rest than officious claimants are at work to rob him of the credit of originating Arbor day. They were all discreetly silent while he was on earth to

defend his title to that honor, but his Nebraska friends will see that he is not robbed of it, now or hereafter.—Kearney Hub.

Two ministers of the Christian denomination who co-operated in an effort to heal a quarrel in the church at Centropolis, a little village in Franklin county, Kansas, were pelted with eggs as they left the church.
