July 25. Board met pursuant to adjournment.

Present full board and county clerk when the following business was had and done.

Claims were audited and allowed as follows:

L. E. Roach having withdrawn as attorney for the county in the case of Ridgely vs. County A. Muldoon is hereby appointed as attorney for county in said case.

Not voting, Kelleher.
 Upon petition of James Sykes and n'ne others, Nathaniel Lapp is hereby appointed road overseer of district No. 54 to fill vacancy, and official bond approved.

John C. Weir is hereby appointed road overseer in district No. 7.

Herman Koester is hereby appointed road overseer road district No. 47.

Jorgen Rossen is hereby appointed road overseer district No. 29.

Official bond of Geo. W. Parson road overseer of district No. 33 is hereby approved.

Upon petition of Cecil Tuell and others W. T. S. Connor is hereby appointed road overseer of district No. 42, to fill vacancy.

Dr. George B. Dent is hereby employed as county physician for one year at a salary of \$200 and necessary expenses.

The petition of John Bonesteel and others for location of road No. 234 is hereby denied and the county clerk is instructed to notify the petitioners that the cost \$12.45 of same is taxed to them.

Communication of Ellen Youngberg in reference to changing road referred to Commissioner Kelleher.

Communication of W. T. Jones, justice of the peace, Walker precinct referred to Jas. M. Ray, postmaster.

Petition of John S. and Fred Peckham referred to Commissioner Kelleher.

Report of O. A. Neale, county Superintendent for first and second quarters 1902 for the institute fund examined, approved and ordered filed.

Upon petition of Geo. E. Harden and twenty-three others, the county clerk is hereby instructed to notify road overseer of district No. 31 to open to travel road No. 64 where said road crosses sec. 19, township 14, range 29 July 26, 1902.
