

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Section One of Article Fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Ne braska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amend-ments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved and Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: SECTION 1. That Section One of Ar-ticle F.freev, of the Constitution of the State of Neoraska, be amended to read

Section 1. Either branch of the legislature may propo e amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-tifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the others when he meets them in then some even larger. town. 
