PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has invited the coal barons and leaders of their striking employes to meet him at the White House today and have a heart-to-heart talk. The president hopes to be able to persuade the opposing factions to make concessions and thus end the strike.

If endorsements from the papers and the people cut any figure, Geo. C. McAllister, the republican candidate for representative, will be elected by a full thousand majority. McAllister is an honest, capable man, and will make a record as a legislator that will be creditable to himself and his constituents.

It is amusing to hear the fusionists jibe Judge Kinkaid on his age, when he is at least fifteen years younger than Barry, the fusion candidate. Judge Kinkaid is a hale, hearty man, as is attested by the fact that he rode eighty miles across the prairies in a buckboard one day last week in the face of a steady rain.

As A. H. Davis, the republican candidate for county attorney, has no opponent, he is not making a canvass of the county, but of course solicits the votes of republicans and others when he meets them in town. Mr. Davis is an energetic man, a close student of law, and his success in the local courts is evidence of his ability as a lawyer.

The fusionists are centering all their campaign work in the Third commissioner district with a hope that they may be able to elect their candidate, Mr. McMichael. In this however, they will be disappointed, as all indications point to the election of the republican candidate, Chas. A. Glaze, by a good sized majority. Mr. Glaze has been a resident of Lincoln county for fifteen or twenty years, is well known as a man of business ability and his integrity is unquestioned. It should be a pleasure for the voters of the Third district to support for office a man who has so clean a record and so well fitted for the office as is Mr. Glaze.

The hens of Lincoln county have caught the strike fever and positively refuse to do business. As a result twenty cents per dozen are asked and nearly all those sold in town are shipped in from stations down the road. These eggs cost the merchant twenty cents a dozen laid down, so that he is supplying them to his customers at that price as matter of accommodation.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment.

The following Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the Electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the General Election to be held Tuesday November 4th, A. D. 1902.

A Joint Resolution proposing to amend Section One of Article Fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be it Resolved and Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska: SECTION 1. That Section One of Article Fifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

SECTION 1. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journals, with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published, for thirty days immediately preceding the next election of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if a majority of the electors voting at such election on such proposed amendment, shall vote to adopt such amendment, the same shall become a part of this Constitution.

When more than one amendment is submitted at the same election, they shall be so submitted as to enable the electors to vote on each amendment separately.

All ballots used at such election on such amendment or amendments shall have written or printed thereon the following: For proposed amendment to the Constitution relating to (here insert the subject of the amendment) and, against proposed amendment to the Constitution relating to (here insert the subject of the amendment) and the vote of each elector voting on such amendment or amendments shall be designated by the elector by making a cross with a pen or pencil in a circle or square to be placed at the right of the lines the words "For or Against" the proposed amendments as he shall desire to vote thereon, or by indicating his preference on a voting machine when such machine is in use.

I, Geo. W. Marsh, secretary of state of the state of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the Twenty-seventh session of the legislature of the state of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 4th day of November, A. D. 1902.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the State of Nebraska, Done at Lincoln this 22d day of July in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Two, of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh, and of this State the Thirty-sixth.
