November 18th, 1902.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, present full board and county clerk.

The petition of Lillie J. Mott and eleven others to change roads number 93 and 112 is hereby granted to run on the old lines between points of beginning and ending as asked in the petition.

The official bond of Ora E. Elder as deputy sheriff is hereby approved.

Claim of F. J. Cook for taxes paid under protest disallowed for the reason that there is no evidence to show that said taxes had ever been legally paid.

The official bond of A. H. Davis as county attorney is hereby approved.

It appearing that on account of the absence from the county for more than sixty days of C. L. Patterson, a vacancy exists in North Platte No. 2 in the office of constable, and to fill such vacancy R. H. Langford is hereby appointed and his official bond is approved.

The official bond of Thos. Bateman as assessor of North Platte No. 2 is hereby approved.

Claim of Paul G. Meyer, measuring grades, allowed on the road fund of commissioner district No. 3 for 640.

It is hereby ordered that the overseer of highways in District No. 31 build a cattle chute across road No. 173 to connect the pasture lands of Geo. Long and the clerk is instructed to notify said overseer.
