COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

December 23, 1902.
Board met pursuant to adjournment, present full board and county clerk.

Upon petition of Franklin Peale for rebate of taxes on lot 3, section 28, town 14, range 30, for the year 1892 for the reason that the improvements on said lot were burned in that year, the petition is hereby granted and the following order was made: C. F. Scharmann, county treasurer: You are hereby authorized to accept in full payment of the tax on lot 3, section 28, town 14, range 30, for the year 1892 a sum based upon the valuation of said lot for the year 1893. Signed: Jas. S. Robbins, M. L. McCullough and John D. Kelleher, commissioners.

The county surveyor is hereby instructed to survey and plat the change made in road No. 112.

Permission is hereby granted H. J. Mott to erect a cattle chute across road No. 112 at his own expense.

Claim of E. H. Springer for right of way on Road No. 255 allowed on District No. 33 for the sum of 10.00.

Claim of W. J. Eavey for right of way on Road No. 255 allowed on District No. 33 for the sum of 60.00.

Settlement with T. T. Keliher as late sheriff of Lincoln county and bills allowed on county general fund for \$950.00, which is in full settlement of all claims of said T. T. Keliher as sheriff of said county of Lincoln.
