AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance providing for the submitting to the electors in the city of North Platte, in the county of Lincoln, State of Nebraska, the question, "Shall said city of North Platte issue its water bonds in the sum of \$90,000.00 in denominations of \$1,000.00 each, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, to be dated August 1st, A. D. 1908, due in twenty years from their date, but payable at any time from five years after their date at the option of said city, for the purpose of obtaining money with which to erect and construct a system of waterworks for the use and benefit of said city and the inhabitants thereof, the said waterworks to be operated and maintained by said city; the wells and power house to be located convenient to the Union Pacific Railroad track in the north tier of blocks of the North Platte Town Lot Company's Addition to North Platte, and the cast iron main to be laid so that all property in the city and its additions shall be protected against fire; and to provide for the levying and collecting by the proper officials in said city, a tax sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature."

Be it ordained by the city council of the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska:

Section 1. That a special election be held and the same is hereby called to be held in said city of North Platte on the 14th day of July 1908, the polling places to be at the Hose House in the First ward of said city, at the Hose House in the Second ward of said city and at the Hose House in the Third ward of said city, at which election the following proposition will be submitted to the voters of said city:—

"Shall the City of North Platte, in the County of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, issue its water bonds in the sum of ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00), in denominations of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) each, to be dated August 1st, A. D., 1908, due in twenty years from their date but payable at any time after five years from their date at the option of said city, the bonds to draw interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the State of Nebraska in the City of New York, and said bonds to be designated as "City of North Platte Water Bonds." Said bonds to be used for the purpose of obtaining money to erect and construct a system of waterworks for the use and benefit of said city and the inhabitants thereof, the said waterworks to be operated and maintained by said city. The wells and power house to be located convenient to the Union Pacific Railroad track in the north tier of blocks of the North Platte Town Lot Company's Addition to North Platte. The cast iron main to be laid so that all property in the city and its additions shall be protected against fire. And shall the proper officers of said city be authorized to levy and collect a tax in the same manner as other municipal taxes may be levied and collected in an amount sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as the same mature in addition to the sum authorized to be levied in section 8913 of Cobby's Annotated Statutes of Nebraska for the year of 1907, on all property within said city as shown and valued upon the assessment roll of the assessors of said city, said bonds to be negotiable in form.

The ballots to be used at said election shall have printed thereon: "For issuing ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) of water bonds of the city of North Platte, in the county of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, for the purpose of obtaining money to erect, to

construct and after construction to operate and to maintain a system of water works in said city for the use and benefit of said city and the inhabitants thereof. And for levying and collecting a tax annually to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature." "Against issuing ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) of water bonds of the city of North Platte, in the county of Lincoln, in the State of Nebraska, for the purpose of obtaining money to erect, to construct and after construction to operate and to maintain a system of water works in said city for the use and benefit of said city and the inhabitants thereof. And for levying and collecting a tax annually to pay the interest and principal of said bonds as they mature."

Said election to be opened at 8 o'clock a. m., and continue open until 6 o'clock p. m., central standard time on day of election.

Section 2. Those voting in favor of said proposition, shall mark their ballots with an (X) after the paragraph beginning, "for issuing ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) of water bonds of the city of North Platte," those voting against said proposition shall mark their ballots with an (X) after the paragraph beginning, "against issuing ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00) of water bonds of the city of North Platte."

Section 3. Notice of said election shall be given by publication in the North Platte Tribune and the North Platte Telegraph, both newspapers published and of general circulation in said city, for two weeks prior to the date of said election, and the clerk of said city is hereby instructed to cause publication of said notice to be made.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
