### Will Enlarge Lake.

Work orders have been issued for the enlargement of the Union Pacific ice lake and it is expected that a large force of men and teams will be engaged in the immediate future. As now contemplated, and as surveyed, the area of the lake will be nearly doubled its present size, the main extension running north and west toward the river. This will shorten the feeder ditch, which was a source of considerable annoyance last winter on account of it freezing over and interferring with the flow of the water.

## Frazier-U. P. Case Settled.

The case of John Frazier against the Union Pacific company, in which the latter was enjoined from constructing its new stockyards on the grounds that it polluted the stream feeding the plaintiff's ice lake, was settled out of court Tuesday, Mr. Frazier going to Omaha to effect the settlement. Mr. Frazier sells his thirty-five acres of land to the company, retaining the ice houses. It is said Mr. Frazier received \$7,000 for his interests. The settlement of the case will permit the company to at once go ahead and complete the yards.



Business Picking Up. That freight traffic on the Union Pacific is picking up is evidenced by the conditions at this terminal. Several freight brakemen who were on the suspended list have been re-instated; an emergency caboose has put into service and will probably be assigned in a few days; six men have been added to the car repair gang, and last Monday 137 refrigerator cars were iced in transit at the local plant, the largest number any day so far this season. The number of freight crews has not been increased lately, but that they are stationary is due not to slack business but to the increased tonnage per train over last year. Certainly under present conditions the Union Pacific cannot claim that it is not enjoying a large degree of prosperity or that it is not making money.
