#### Mr. Bryan and New York.

The claims of over-enthusiastic democrats that Mr. Bryan can be elected without New York is not easily reconciled to existing political conditions of the country. It is true that it would be a fine feather in Mr. Bryan's cap if he could be elected without aid from "the enemy's country." but there are some stubborn facts that loom largely in the path as obstacles to the consummation of such hopes.

The total vote in the electoral college is 476, of which 239 are necessary to a choice. The problem is for Mr. Bryan to find 239 electoral votes within his reach outside New York. He can accomplish it only with the entire vote of the southern and western states. For electoral vote purposes let the states be classified thus:

Eastern States-Connecticut, 7; Delaware, 3; Maine, 6; Maryland, 4; New Hampshire, 4; New Jersey, 12; New York, 39; Ohio, 23; Pennsylvania, 34; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 4; total 160.

Southern States-Alabama, 11; Arkansas, 9; Florida, 5; Georgia, 13; Kentucky, 13; Louisiana, 9; Mississippi, 10; North Carolina, 12; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee, 12; Texas, 18; Virginia, 12; West Virginia, 7; total 140.

Western States—Colorado, 5; Idaho, 3; Illinois, 27; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10; Michigan, 14; Minnesots, a germ or parasite that burrows into the hair follicles. Conceding Mr. Bryan the solid south, which is by no means assured to him which is by no means assured to him this year, he would start with 140 votes to his credit, or 99 short of the number necessary to an election. His friends admit that these votes must be had from the west. Of the states designated as "western" and "Pacific coast" Mr. Bryan in 1896 carried Colorado, 4; Idaho, 3; Missouri, 17; Montana, 3; Kansas, 10; Nebraska, 8; Nevada, 3; South Dakota, 4; Utah, 3;

Washington, 4; Wyoming, 3. and one electoral vote in California; total, 63.

In 1900 all of these states slipped away from Mr. Bryan except Colorado, 4; Idaho, 3; Montana, 3, Nevada, 3; and Missouri, 17; total, 30. In 1904 these four states went into the republican column, leaving the democratic party, under the Parker leadership, without a vote in the electoral college from a state north of Mason and Dixon's line. Mr. Bryan received 155 electoral votes in 1900, of which but 30 came from the states to which he must look this year for 99 votes, in order to win the election without New York.

Allowing Mr. Bryan the 140 votes of the solid south and adding the votes of Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Nebraska, Nevada, South Dakota and Missouri, a total of 47, he would have 187 votes, or 52 short of a majority in the electoral college. Wisconsin and Indiana are both republican, but the democrats profess to believe that factional fights in Wisconsin and Kern's strength in Indiana would place both in the democratic column. Making that change for the sake of argument, Mr. Bryan would gain 15 votes in Indiana and 13 in Wisconsin, a total of 28, which, added to his 182, would give him 210, or still 29 short of the required number. Giving Ohio to Bryan, he would have 233 votes, or still 6 short, and even if Delaware were thrown in for good measure, he would lack two to give him a majority.

As a matter of fact, Bryan has only the slightest chance of carrying Indiana, Wisconsin, Colorado, Utah, Montana or Nebraska, while he is not sure of holding Missouri, Kentucky, North Carolina and Tennesee. Cattlemen of the west who make a business of handling range stock are up in arms against a proposed law for the handling of cattle in transit, which, they say, will prove very expensive to them. The law now provides that cattle may not be kept in cars over twentyeight hours without feed and water except on a properly signed request from the shippers, when the limit may be extended to thirty-six hours. The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Me-braska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, No-vember 3rd, A. D. 1908:

JOINT RESOLUTION to amend

A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Sections two (2), four (4), five (5), six (6) and thirteen (13) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relating to Judicial Powers.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:
Section 1. Amendment proposed. That Section two (2) of Article six (6) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska:
be amended to read as follows:
Section 2. (Supreme court; judges; jurisdiction.) The Supreme Court shall consist of seven (7) judges; and a majority of all elected and qualified judges shall be necessary to constitute a quorum or pronounce a decision. The Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction in all cases relating to the revenue, civil cases in which the state is a party, mandamin.

Supreme Court shall have jurisdiction in all cases relating to the revenue, civil cases in which the state is a party, mandamus, quo warranto, habeas corpus, and such appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law.
