Bert Brown Badly Scalded.

Bert Brown, who has charge of the
clam-shell scoop at the Union Pacific
ice lake, was badly scalded by steam
yesterday afternoon, the burns affect-
ing his hands, face and legs. His in-
juries are so serious that it is the pre-
sent intention to send him to an Omaha
hospital for treatment.

The accident was due to the breaking
of the clamp which held the scoop
rigid, and when this broke the car con-
taining the engine and boiler toppled
over, allowing the steam to escape.
Mr. Brown was thrown in such a posi-
tion that he could not get away from
the released steam in time to avoid
being scalded. As soon as he could
get to his feet he ran and jumped into
the lake, which cooled off the heated
clothing, else the burns on legs would
have been worse.

Will Remodel Store Room.

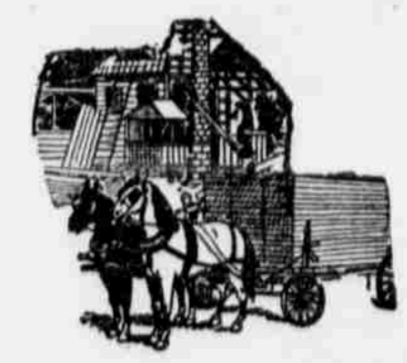
