Ill-Mated Couples.

Saturday Judge Grimes granted a divorce to C. D. Raney on the ground that his wife Jennie Raney had deserted him for more than two years.

Yesterday Veve Stevens filed a petition in the district court for a divorce from her husband Martin Stevens for cruelty and non-support. They were married at Yonman in 1899.

Pearl LeRoy asks for legal separation from her husband Chas. J. LeRoy to whom she was married at Hayes Center in 1904. The ground upon which the divorce is asked is cruelty and neglect. Mrs. LeRoy filed her petition yesterday.

Dies of Injuries.

Bert Brown, who was so severely scalded while handling the steam shovel at the ice lake last Thursday afternoon, died from the effects at 8:30 Saturday morning. The condition of the patient seemed favorable for recovery up to Friday night, when he began sinking rapidly until death ensued. A post-mortem revealed the fact that the burns had seriously affected his kidneys and other organs.

The deceased was thirty-one years of age and came to North Platte from Keith county when a mere child. In 1898 he became a member of Company E, N. N. G., and went with that company to Chickamauga Park. Shortly after his return home he was united in marriage to Miss Ida Neir, who with four children, survive him. For six or eight years he was in the service of the Union Pacific as fireman and was in the employ of the company when the accident occurred. Bert was an industrious young man of excellent habits, and his death is regretted by all, and to the relatives the sympathy of our people goes forth.

The funeral was held from the Episcopal church at three o'clock this afternoon.

Young Girl Ends Life.

Nettie Lamb, the nineteen year old daughter of R. N. Lamb, the Third ward merchant, committed suicide about eight-thirty Friday evening by shooting herself through the left breast with a revolver. She had spent the early part of the evening with Mrs. Bert Napersteek, and complaining of feeling ill. Mrs. Napersteek suggested that she go into a bed-room and lie down. She entered the room, but returned shortly, saying she guessed she had better go home. Later it was learned that while in the bedroom she had secreted a revolver she had found in the drawer of a dresser. Arriving at home she entered her room, and shortly thereafter the report of a revolver rang out. Going to the room the family found her in a semi-unconscious state with a bullet wound in her left breast. A physician was hurriedly summoned, but nothing could be done to save her life and death ensued about eleven o'clock.

The cause of the act is attributed to unrequited love, a young man breaking an engagement a few days previous.

Funeral services were held at the residence Saturday evening and the following morning the remains were taken to McPherson county for interment, the family having resided in that county previous to removing to North Platte.

The sad ending of the young girl's life was heartrending to the family and deeply regretted by a large circle of young friends.

An Emotional Melodrama.

From that time until the knavery is overtaken there is excitement of various sorts. She is abducted, held prisoner, is the victim of a scheming woman and a man who is thoroughly bad, but in the end she escapes it all. The play is beautifully staged, the cast and prison scenes being particularly effective.

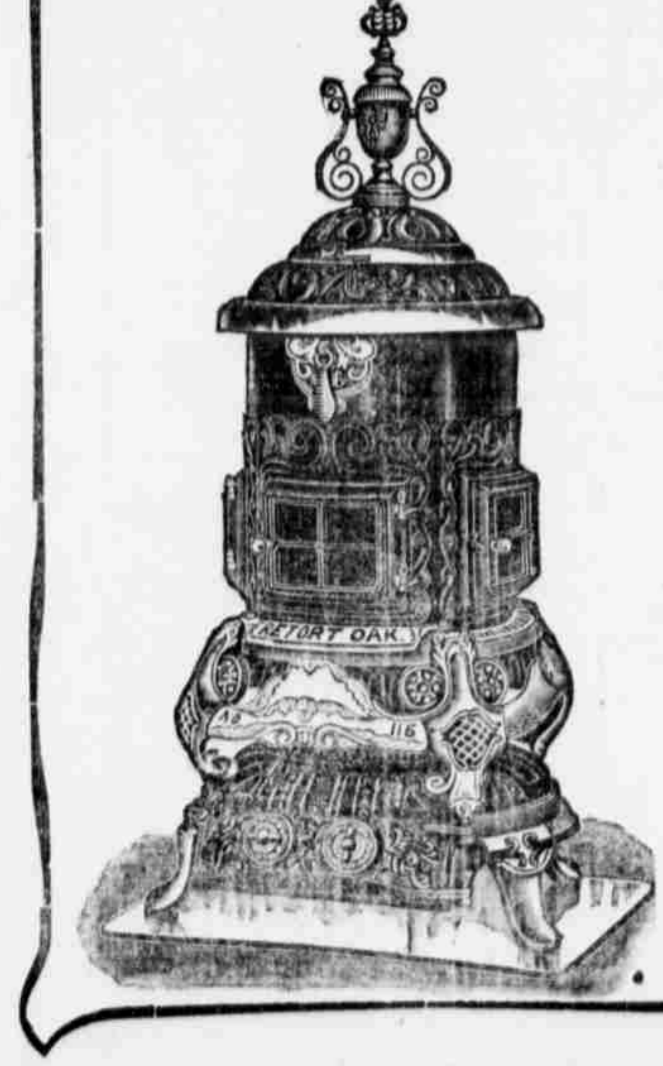
