Population Increases.

The steel on the North River branch of the Union Pacific is now laid as far as Lisca, twenty-six miles below Bridgeport, says the Goring Courier.

Dipping Association.

Owing to the fact that the government cattle inspector has been traveling on the South Side and in the vicinity of Gothenburg where he demanded that all cattle be dipped, the farmers south of the river met last week and formed a dipping association.

Thirteen shares were sold at \$20 each and a vat will be placed on the Young ranch five miles south of Brady where cattle can be dipped.

Wireless Telegraphy Signals.

A recent dispatch sent out from Omaha says: To be able to signal into the cab of a moving locomotive has long been considered by railroad men as the most desirable achievement in the effort to prevent wrecks.

A neat contrivance is placed in the cab of the locomotive consisting of a signal device, similar to that used in the block signals.

The wireless signal may be operated in connection with the block signal device and is so arranged that a train may be stopped after it has passed a station at which it should have been stopped.

Serves Injunction on City Council.

At the last meeting of the city council, the board passed an ordinance granting The Farmers Telephone Company a franchise to run their telephone line into the city.

GROWTH OF WEALTH PER CAPITA.

Doctrine that the Poor Are Growing Poorer Shown to Be False.

(From the Los Angeles Times.)

In 1820 the savings banks of the United States held \$1,138,576. This was a poor country then compared with now.

The amount was only an average of 12 cents for the population of that time. That amount of average economy was very small.

Now the people of this country have \$3,690,878,945 in savings banks. This is an average for the whole population of this time of over \$42.

The actual depositors have an average of \$125 to their credit. In 1820 only 653 persons in the country were rich enough to have a savings bank account.

Now there are 8,588,811. When James Buchanan, the last Democratic President in a long line went into office, there was about \$100,000,000 in the savings banks of the United States.

By 1870, after fighting out the great war, the people, under Republican rule for twenty years, had \$500,000,000 in the savings banks. When the next Democratic President took his seat in 1883, the savings of the people had passed the billion point.

By 1898 the savings had doubled again. So there it is. In 1820 there were only about 8,000 people rich enough to have a savings bank account.

Now there are over 8,000,000. In 1820 the savings were 12 cents per capita; now they are over \$42.

That the poor grow poorer and the rich richer in this country is as true as any other Populist notion.

Last September a man whose name is supposed to be J. A. Douglas was in Lexington taking orders for suits of clothing for a Chicago house, as he alleged. Payments in advance to the extent of \$30 were made by those who gave him orders.
