That justice is sometimes meted out with a swiftness that is staggering was evidenced in Chicago Tuesday when Peter Van Vlissingen, a real estate dealer for years classed among the first of Chicago's prosperous and reputable business men confessed to having obtained through forged deeds and notes more than \$700,000, and a few hours after his arrest, on his urgent appeal to be punished, was sentenced to the penitentiary.

Governor Hughes' expense bill filed in New York shows that his campaign for governor cost him but \$369.65. Chandler expended \$7,305.27. When a man can be elected against bitter factional opposition and spend but \$369 in the Empire state of the Union it is time for state and political organizations generally to get in line with a reform which will give poor men a chance to run for state and federal offices.

Nebraska cast the largest vote in its history at the last election, the total vote as officially tabulated in the office of the secretary of state being 271,396. The total vote in 1904 was 225,788. The socialist vote in the state has fallen off. Harbaugh polled 3,069 votes for governor. The vote given Stebbins for supreme judge was 3,200 and in 1904 Vail, the socialist candidate for governor, received 5,122. The prohibition party vote also shows a loss. The total vote given Roy Teeters was 4,464. Graves received 5,158 for supreme judge and Swallow, prohibition candidate for president, received 6,338.

A good many people who have followed the case of the government against the Standard Oil company at Chicago agree with President Roosevelt in thinking that the decision of the circuit court of appeals against the government and in favor of the company involves a gross miscarriage of justice. The gross impropriety of the president's saying so is to be conceded, but of the correctness of such an opinion there is much reason for making no question. It is to be hoped, therefore, that the government will succeed in an effort to have the whole case brought for review before the United States supreme court. It should not be left where it is by the refusal of the circuit court of appeals to hear the case over again.—Springfield Republican.

We agree with the Beatrice Express when it says: Another desirable amendment to the Nebraska constitution would be a provision creating four year terms for state officers. No sooner does a state officer become thoroughly acquainted with his duties and able to render the best service than he must again enter the political arena and run the chance of being defeated or re-elected, if he has devoted valuable time belonging to the state to campaigning. If defeated, his experience is lost to the public and a new man must be trained in the service to become an efficient successor. In addition, it is generally conceded that an officer is entitled to re-election if his work has been satisfactory. He cannot feel warranted in removing to Lincoln and taking up a new line of work for one term. Therefore, altogether, a state officer's term ought to be extended from two to four years, a provision wisely made by the constitutions of some other states.

The republicans lost only the head and tail of their state ticket—Governor Sheldon and Railroad Commissioner Williams. Since these two officials led in proposing and enforcing legislation for regulation of the railroads it may well be assumed that the railroads are thoroughly pleased with the outcome. The Railway Employees' association declared specifically against Mr. Williams. The nomination at the primaries it certainly furnished enuf votes to give the democratic majority of 562 votes. This association will, therefore, doubtless feel that its organization and activity has not been in vain. But the result can only afford personal satisfaction. It will in no wise effect the enforcement of the laws enacted two years ago by a republican legislature. Two of three members of the state railway commission will remain republican. And the republican attorney-general, upon whom devolves the duty to cooperate with the commission, has been re-elected and he may be depended upon to continue to give his vigorous and impartial efforts toward carrying out the purposes of the law.—Fremont Tribune.

Two New Fast Mail Trains. The Hill lines are to make a fight for the privilege of carrying the government mail from Chicago to the Puget Sound country which is now carried by the Burlington from Chicago to Omaha and by the Union Pacific from Omaha and west.

This means that a real struggle will be inaugurated for the business, which has reached enormous proportions. The Harriman officials have arranged for a new train which will make the run between Chicago and Portland in seventy-two hours, the same time now made by the Overland Limited between Chicago and San Francisco. The Hill lines plan to run a new train over the Spokane, Portland and Seattle via Billings over the Northern Pacific and over the Burlington through Omaha to Chicago.

It is further directed that a copy of this order be mailed to each of the creditors and other parties interested in the bankrupt's estate herein at least ten days prior to the date of said sale, and that the trustee advertise said sale at least ten days prior to the date thereof and give such other notice as he may deem advisable.
