ALL will agree with Mr. Harriman when he says that idle money makes idle men. When capital is out at work the mills and factories are busy, all classes of improvements are being made and there is a demand for labor; but when money is deposited in banks on time certificates or buried in the toe of a stocking, a surplusage of labor invariably follows.

THE year now drawing to a close has proven one of the most prosperous North Platte has ever known. In building operations it equals last year, in fact surpasses 1907 in the number of residences erected. The new year promises even better things, and there is no cause for people to change their opinion as to North Platte being one of the best towns in the west.

The Carter postal savings bank bill is scheduled to come up in the United States Senate early next week. Congressmen, it is said, are receiving many letters urging them to defeat the bill. These requests, undoubtedly, come from bank officers, and not from the "plain people", for the latter are in favor of the measure, yet do not take as much interest in the matter as the bankers.

REALIZING that W. J. Bryan's influence will be potent with the next Nebraska legislature, says the Lincoln News, leaders of the fight for county option are preparing to force the issue in such a way that he will be compelled to take sides upon it. The declaration is made in an emphatic manner, says the News, that he must show his hand or his future political ambitions, whether for the senate or in some other direction, will be opposed by the organized temperance forces in Nebraska. A committee of educators, comprising the presidents and chancellors of universities, colleges and academies of the state, will be chosen to pay him a visit and ask his support for a county option bill. The senate is said to be practically a tie and both sides claim the house. In this situation it is practically up to Mr. Bryan to cast the deciding vote.

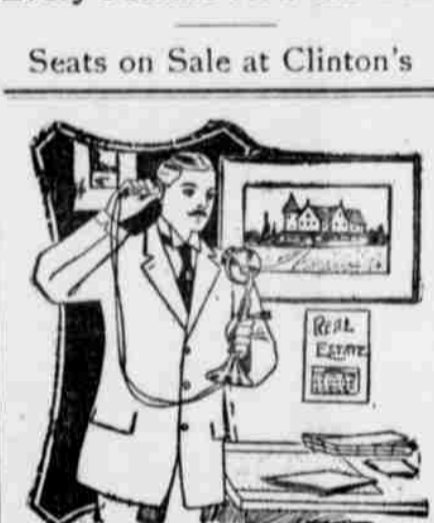
