Shall the State Capitol be Moved? THE TRIBUNE has at different times suggested the removal of the state capitol from Lincoln to some point in the central part of the state, and though the matter was at first mention accepted as a joke, it is now taken seriously, not only by the people west of the Merrick county line, but by people in the extreme eastern part of the state.

Senator Bartos, of Saline county, has prepared a resolution which will be pre-

sented to the legislature today which provides for the appointment of a com-Lincoln and the necessity of removing the sent of state government to Kear-dey because of the demands of western Nebraska for a location more nearly in the central part of the state.

The resolution states that the present capitol was located at Lincoln when the population of the state was within a hundred miles of the Missouri river, but that since then central and west-ern parts have so increased in popula-tion that Kearney is the hub of the state as well as of the United States; that the outer walls of the state capitol are dangerous, the roof is rotten, the walls sunken and that the building is inadequate to the needs of the state The resolution further recites that the location of the capitol is so far distant that it works a hardship to two-thirds of the state. It is recommended that this special committee to investigate shall consist of Bartos, Buck, Ramsom Meyers, Bodison and Raymond, the latter being the state senator from this

To remove the seat of government takes a majority vote of the electors of the state at a general or special elec-tion called for that purpose. The capi-tal was located at Lincola in 1867 and fourth quarter 143.50 the amendment providing that its removal must be by a vote of the electors was incorporated in the constitution of

The Tribune believes that the news papers and the citizens of western Nebraska should awaken to the impor-tance of this move and push the matter along. While we believe Grand Island is the best located town for a state capital, yet we are not adverse to pulling for Kearney if the majority favor

Nothing Expected From Legislature.

And now the World-Herald admits the republicans have given the people of Nebraska all the reform legislation that is necessary. It says freight and passenger rates are low enough and the assessment of railway property is eminently satisfactory. That erudite journal has also discovered since election that no reforms have been overlooked by the republicans, and that there is therefore nothing for the dem-ocratic egislature to do but make the appropriations and conjure up some kind of a bank deposit guarantee bill that will not be dangerous, but will look good to the unsophiscated. If the World-Herald and the democrats in general had made these admissions dur-ing the campaign, the result at the polls might have been different, but ev-en that is very doubtful. The people turned the republicans down right where reform was most conspicuous and the fact really is, the democrats were elected to do nothing, and their promises were not taken seriously. In fact, the people never take the promises of the democrats seriously. They elect them to office when they want a rest. Nothing need be expected from this legislature except a bunch of lemons.—York Times.
