The Treasurer's Statement.

Elsewhere is published the semiannual statement of County Treasurer Langford showing the receipts and disbursement of monies for the six months ending December 31st, 1908. A great part of this statement is "Greek" to the average reader, but there are some items that we wish to emphasize. One is that the amount of the 1907 tax charged up to the treasurer was \$200,-246.59, and of that amount there has been collected the sum of \$200,001.60, leaving only \$244.99 as the balance of uncollected taxes for that year. Certainly that is a very creditable showing, and evidence that our people are prosperous, for when they are not prosperous they allow themselves to become delinquent in the payment of taxes.

The amount of the 1908 tax charged to the treasurer is \$219,392.30, of which amount there has been collected \$108,-850.46, the amount collected being largely personal tax, as real estate taxes do not become delinquent until May 1st and few pay the real estate taxes prior to that time.

Another item of interest is that during the year 1908 the fees earned by the treasurer's office were \$5,085.10, while the expenses of the office were \$4,027.43, leaving an excess of \$1,057.57 which has been turned back into the treasury.

On February 1st the county treasurer remitted to the state treasurer the sum of \$36,041.02, which represented the balance due the state on taxes and money collected up to January 1, 1908.
