It is proposed that the monuments shall be erected under the supervision of the regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution in Nebraska, a patriotic body that has been working actively along this line. The fact that Ezra Meeker has recently gone over the old trail and designated spots suitable for the monument markings makes the project timely and the present legislature should not pass it to another two years later. The object of the bill is one that commends itself for every patriotic citizen. -Kearney Hub.
