Notice to Electric Light Patrons.

Since we changed our system to the "60 cycle" current which our new apparatus generates, we have discovered that some of our meters, particularly one type of Westinghouse meter, are running too fast. The adjustment provided by the factory seems not to give the proper compensation for the altered current, and to standardize them will require a test of all our meters, which cannot easily be done without day service. We are now installing a new engine for this purpose and expect to be operating a 24 hour service by April 1st, and we propose to then make a careful test of all meters in use. Whatever per cent of inaccuracy develops, if in the customers' favor, will be placed to his credit, reckoning back to Jan. 1st, or will be refunded if preferred.
