OVER five hundred bills have been introduced in the legislature, eleven of which were presented by Representative Bushie of this district.

Dry Farming Congress.

Two years ago the commercial club of Denver called a meeting of those interested in dry farming at Denver in connection with the Western Stock show.

The purpose of the congress is to collect and disseminate information concerning dry land agriculture. This is defined as farming anywhere without irrigation or seepage water where the rainfall does not exceed twenty inches per year.
