THE democratic majority in the lower house of the Nebraska legislature has recommended for passage the bank guaranty bill. It is admitted that the measure does not provide for the actual guaranty of deposits, nor does it provide for the immediate payment of losses in case of bank failures, in other words the measure amounts to but little. The democrats hope, however, to make the voters believe that by passing the measure they have fulfilled their platform pledge.

The statistics for December 1908, just issued by the federal officials furnish certain assuring evidences of improvement in trade over the corresponding period of 1907, at the height of the industrial depression. The greatest improvement shown is in the importation of crude materials for use in the manufactures which aggregate \$41,176,000 for December, 1908, as compared with \$29,130,000 for December of the preceding year. The imports of that character for last December were only \$3,000,000 less than for December, 1906, one of the best months in history.

By a vote of forty-six to forty-one, the bill introduced in the legislature providing that saloons shall open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m., was indefinitely postponed or in other words killed. The bill was formerly recommended to pass by the committee of the whole by a vote of forty to thirty-nine, but the saloon interests became active and this activity resulted in victory for the whiskey men when the bill came up for passage. In Lincoln they have the "daylight" saloons, and they are found to be a great improvement over the midnight saloons.
