Kelley Bound Over.

John P. Kelley, former manager of U. S. Grocery Co., was bound over to Write L. L. Brown, Evanston, Wyo. the district court by Judge Elder yesterday afternoon on the charge of larcency. Unable to furnish Side Barn. the \$500 bond, he was remanded to jail.

The crime with which Kelly is charged is the theft of a cash register valued at \$200, which disappeared about the time the grocery company went into involuntary bankruptcy. Later the register was found in a barn, and evidence was secured that indicated that Kelly, with the assistance of others, had removed the register at midnight and secreted it in the barn. However, at the bankruptcy proceedings Kelly testifieed that he knew nothing about the disappearance of the register, and following his evidence a warrant was issued from the federal court charging him with prejury as a witness. He was later apprehended at Cheyenne, taken to Omaha and bound over to the January, 1910, term of the federal court. His father came out from the east and gave a cash bond of \$1,000 to keep his son from spending the intervening time in jail.

In the meantime a warrant charging Kelly with the theft of the register oxfords and pumps. was issued, but no special effort to find him was made. Kelly, however, arrived in town the latter part of last to \$4.00. week, and his arrested and preliminary hearing followed.

The former governor had talked briefly and then stepped back into the crowd and Mrs. Frances B. Heald had started her talk in favor of the measure. Suddenly the ex-governor began to breathe hard and then gradually collapsed, those close to him catching him as he fell.

Still breathing he was carried across the corridor to the office of the adjutant general, where he died immediately, living probably five minutes from the time he was stricken.
