Patterson Elected Mayor.

As a result of the election held Tuesday, T. C. Patterson will be North Platte's next chief executive, having received a majority of ninety-seven over J. R. White in a total vote of 686. Mr. Patterson received a majority in each of the three wards, which was contrary to the forecast made by people generally, as it was predicted that in the First and Third wards, where the waterworks question figured most strongly, he would lose out. Mr. White was nominated by petition largely through the efforts of the leaders of the Municipal Ownership League, and they worked in his interests; charging Mr. Patterson as being against municipal ownership. Prior to election Mr. Patterson made no statement of his position on the waterworks question, but it was understood by those who supported him that he would if elected be governed in his actions and influence by what he considered was for the best interests of the city, and a majority of the voters reposed confidence in him. It may be added here that it was through the influence of Mr. Patterson that, a number of years ago, a bill was passed by the legislature which increased the amount of bonds which a city of North Platte's class could vote for the purpose of purchasing or building waterworks. It would therefore appear that he was one of the first of our citizens to take up municipal own-

The Tribune regards Mr. Patterson as one of the most progressive citizens North Platte has ever had; that no one takes a greater interest or more pride in our city than he does, and it is confident that when inducted into office his sole view will be to do that which will be to the greatest good to the greatest numbe.

Daylight Saloons.

Governor Shallenberger Tuesday afternoon signed the eight o'clock closing bill and on and after July 1st it will be unlawful for any person to keep a saloon open between the hours of o'clock in the evening and 7 o'clock in the morning or to sell liquor between these hours. Because the bill did not carry the emergency clause it does not after the adjournment of the legislature which will be July 1. Immediately after signing the bill the governor dictated a statement, in which he said: "The plan proposed in this amendment for the entire state has been tried in the capital city of Lincoln, and both "wets" and "drys" alike commend its effect. Business thrives in this city and the hotels and places of amusement claimed most to be effected are being continually improved and constantly crowded with patrons. It is admitted upon all sides that in this city it has had the effect of eliminating much of public rancor from the liquor question.

"This amendment has much opposition in the two Omahas, because business men are fearful that it will affect trade and commerce adversely, and for the further reason that it limits to a certain extent the policy of "home rule" upon this matter. I believe, however, that experience will justify the law, and that our large cities will find that their prosperity does not depend in any way upon two or three extra hours for the sale of liquor.

"If the law is as wholesome in its effect as I believe it will be, it will give solid standing ground for those who believe in strict regulation as the best way to handle this question."

Among the "iasues" killed at this session of the legislature may be listed the "initiative and referendum" so ardently supported by Mr. Bryan; woman suffrage in every form in which it came before the session; all advance in temperance legislation of whatever character excepting the "daylight" saloon bill; assessment of mortgages to the owner of the mortgage, appeals direct to the supreme court from the railway commission making less tedious and expensive the prosecution of suits against the corporations by private individuals. In the language of a leading democratic member of the house "the people have profited little by this legislature with its democratic majority." The bill regulating the charges at stockyards was smothered in the senate after passing-the house and

never came to final vote. In signing the daylight saloon bill Governor Shallenberger has drawn the fire of the liquor interests. Chas. Metz, president of the Metz brewing company of Omaha, had a talk with the governor prior to the primary last summer, in which he quotes the governor as saying: "Now, Mr. Metz, I will not run for governor unless you can assure me that I have the support of the brewing and other liquor interests. I am not in favor of county option, nor
