The weekly Wednesday evening prayer meeting at the Presbyterian church will not be held this week on account of union prayer meeting at the Baptist church.

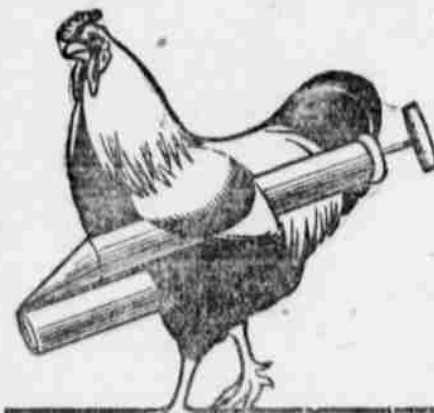
