That U. P. Depot.

City Physician Quigley made an examination of the Union Pacific depot one day this week, and makes the following report:

Considerable has been written in the local papers on the unsanitary condition of our railroad buildings, offices, shops and roundhouse and the depot. The waiting room has been held up to the readers of the local papers as the place demanding the attention of the company most urgently but while this is undoubtedly true, there are other places that are breeding most foul and deadly diseases right under our noses which also urgently demand attention. If the railroad company were convinced that these evils existed and that they were working an economic loss and that they could be remedied very easily, then there is no doubt but that the railroad company would bestir themselves to bring about better conditions. With this end in view the attention of the public and the company is respectfully called to the following unsanitary conditions existing in the waiting room alone. Every item enumerated is a disease breeder. These conditions make it a risk for any civilized person to spend much time in this room.

1. There are no screens on the doors and therefore no precautions taken to keep out flies. Flies are more dangerous than rattlesnakes.

2. The closets are dirty, foul smelling, have constantly wet floors and are poorly ventilated.

3. A dirty drinking cup is kept at a dirty old drinking fountain, and the floor is constantly wet around this fountain. A most filthy slop pail is kept at this fountain.

4. There are several dirty spittoons in which flies feed continually and the floor is covered with dust and dirt. On my visit this morning I found a quantity of vomit, evidently from a drunken man, on the floor.

5. The walls and posts are smeared with spit and dirt, the shades are covered with the accumulated fly specks of years, the radiators have been used for spittoons also the holes in the floor near them with obvious results.

6. A large amount of plaster has fallen from the ceiling and more is liable to fall at any time. The whole aspect of the place is dingy, dirty, dusty, ill smelling, and sickening and one of the worst features of the place is that women and children are compelled to occupy this room along with the worst ruffians that the city affords. Tobacco, both smoking and chewing, is used here in the presence of ladies without protest from the company except the one "No Smoking" sign which has long since ceased to be respected.

At 11:30 the board takes a recess until 3 o'clock p. m., and reconvenes as a board of equalization, present Kocken, and Springer county commissioners, county assessor and county clerk.

No returns from the state board having been received the board takes a recess until July 15th, and at three o'clock the board reconvenes as a board of county commissioners, present Commissioners Kocken and Springer and county clerk.

The various county officials not being ready to have books checked, board adjourned until July 12, 1909.

A member has one year in which to complete a membership, at the rate of \$1 per week or \$5 per month.

Each member is given a \$5 certificate in the Reader's Pool (an interest in some land in University City) when a membership is completed and for each new member secured. The league is about two years old but so phenomenal has been its growth that chapters are being organized all over the country and beautiful chapter houses are springing up. The league's scope and purpose is so great and grand that it cannot be grasped at a glance, but must be studied.

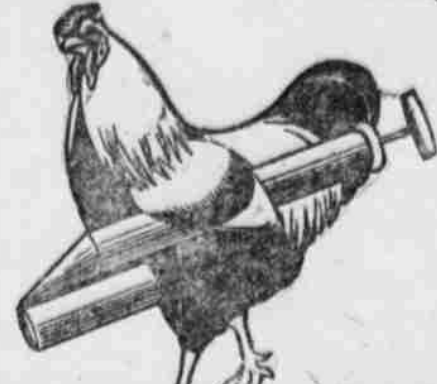
