North Platte and vicinity lost another useful and honored citizen when Joseph Schatz died at his home 416 E 5th St. Friday evening from a complication of deseases and a general run down of

Mr. Schatz had worked continually up to about three weeks ago, when he took a short lay off and went to Denver to receive medical examination. The doctor told him that he had a bad case of kidney trouble. Feeling better he went to work on Saturday, July 3, and again on July 6, but feeling badly he asked for a pass and was going to Omaha to see the cempany physician. Later he did not feel well enough to go and on Friday morning he was taken suddenly ill and gradually sank into an unconscious state and died at o'clock in the evening in the presence

of his family.

The funeral was held yesterday morning from St. Patricks church and was largely attended by his friends and fellow workmen from the shops. At the church the Reqium High Mass was said and Rev. Carrol preached a beautiful sermon on the life and achievements of the deceased. "Calvary" was sang by Mr. Chas Pass and as the procession left the church the choir sang "Nearer my God to Thee." Interment was made in the south side cemetery.

Joseph Schatz, one of five children, Joseph Schatz, one of five children, was born in Whitenburg. Germany on Jan 14, 1844 and seeing a brighter future for himself in America, he came to Jacksonville, Ill, in 1866. He was married in May 25, 1869 to Miss Edwina Fisher and they moved to Omaha, where Mr. Schatz worked in the Union Pacific shops for five years, In 1874 Mr. Schatz came to North Platte and accepted a position in the blacksmith shop here. He was foreman for some time and with the exception of a few years when he worked in Cheyenne few years when he worked in Cheyenne and Grand Island he has worked at

and Grand Island he has worked at this place continually.

On May the 25th last Mr. and Mrs. Schatz celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary and have lived in North Platte during 35 of the 40 years.

A wife and four children survive him, Albert and George of this city, John of Salt Lake and Mrs Wm Jeffers of Ogden. He leaves four brothers and one sister, only one of whom Gregory of this city lives in America.

Mr. Schatz was a pieneer in this vicinity and was well known in every part of Western Nebraska. He was a devoted member of the Reman Catholic church and by his untirring efforts in his home and in the community he has won the affection and munity he has won the affection and good will of his fellow men and his death is a great loss to North Platte.

Non Partisan Law Void.

The nonpartisan judiciary law enacted by the recent legislature was declared void and unconstitutional by the supreme court yesterday afternoon. The judgment of District Judge E. Cornish of Lancaster county was af-firmed and a writ of mandamus will issue to compel Secretary of State Junkin to place the name of John M. Ragan of Hastings on the primary ballot as a candidate for the republican nomination for supreme judge. The nonpartisan judiciary act prohibited the nomation of party candidates for the judiciary or for state or county superintendents, but held candidates for these positions should go on the ticket this fall at the general election


