Bids will be received until four o'clock, p. m., on Thursday, August 19, 1909, at the office of Superintendent W. P. Snyder, on the Experimental Substation farm, at North Platte, for the construction of a two-story frame dwelling house upon said farm, according to plans and specifications on file in the office of the said Superintendent Snyder. Bidders must examine carefully this notice and the form of contract accompanying the specifications. Bids must conform strictly to the plans and specifications and to the requirements of this notice. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some North Platte or Lincoln bank payable to the University of Nebraska unconditionally for the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00). The check of the successful bidder, in case of award, will be held as a guarantee for furnishing to the superintendent of construction schedules of materials with quantities and prices, signing the building contract in form as proposed and furnishing security company or other satisfactory bond in a sum equal to one-third of the contract price of the building. Both the security offered and the form of the bond must be satisfactory to the Board of Regents or its building committee. In case the successful bidder fails within two weeks from the date of the award to file said schedule, fails to furnish said bond as required or to enter into contract at the amount of his bid, the check deposited by him will be forfeited to the University as liquidated damages without further proceedings or notice. All bids must bear the residence or business address of the bidder, must be signed, sealed up, addressed to "Superintendent W. P. Snyder, North Platte, Nebraska," and be plainly marked on the outside with the bidder's name and the words "Building Bid." The bids will be opened and inspected as soon after the date above set for filing the same as the Board of Regents or its building committee can be conveniently assembled. AN ORDINANCE

Providing for the construction of a lateral sewer district to be known as the lateral sewer district E, to consist of blocks 1, 8 and 9 of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Nebraska; said lateral sewer commencing where the center line of the alley running through block 1 intersects the main sewer north of said block, running thence in a southerly direction on the center line of the alley along said blocks 1, 8 and 9 of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska, and where the center line of said land intersects the south line of block 9 in Miller's Addition aforesaid, to be constructed of sewer pipes ten inches in diameter with proper flush tanks, man-holes, and proper appliances; providing for an estimate of the cost thereof and for bids and for making contract for said lateral sewer; also providing for levying against the abutting lots, according to the front footage, along the line of said sewer special assessments to pay the cost of constructing the same.

Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 1. That a lateral sewer district to be known as lateral sewer district E to be formed from blocks 1, 8 and 9 of Miller's Addition to the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska.

Section 2. That a lateral sewer be constructed of ten inch sewer pipes at the proper depth and on a grade, required by the present sewer system of said city, commencing where the center line of the alley in block 1 intersects the main sewer north of said block, running thence in a southerly direction along the center line of the alley in blocks 1, 8 and 9, of Miller's Addition to the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska, to where the center line of said alley intersects the south line of block 9 in said Miller's Addition to the city of North Platte, Nebraska, together with the necessary man-holes, flush tanks and necessary appliances along the line of said proposed lateral sewer.

Section 3. That that the engineer of said city at once prepare and file with the clerk thereof an estimate of the total cost of said proposed lateral sewer.

Section 4. That after said estimate is made and filed as herein provided that the clerk of said city proceed to advertise in manner and form required by law for bids for the construction of said lateral sewer and appliances, reserving to said city the right to reject any and all bids therefor.

Section 5. If an approved bid be made for said work that a contract therefor be entered into by the mayor of said city attested by the clerk with the necessary provisions protecting the interest of said city upon the contractor furnishing a bond in a sufficient amount for the faithful performance of said contract.

Section 6. To pay the costs of construction of said lateral sewer, flush tanks, man-holes and appliances, a special assessment shall be levied according to law against the lots abutting on the line of said lateral sewer according to the foot frontage thereof.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE

Providing for the construction of a lateral sewer district to be known as lateral sewer district G 1, to consist of blocks numbered, 4, 5, 12 and 13 of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Nebraska, said lateral sewer commencing where the center line of the alley in block 4 intersects the main sewer in said block running thence in a southerly direction on the center line of the alley in said blocks 4, 5, 12 and 13, of Miller's Addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska, to where the center line of said alley intersects with the south line of block 13 in Miller's Addition aforesaid, to be constructed of sewer pipes ten inches in diameter, with proper flush tanks, man-holes and proper appliances providing for an estimate of the cost thereof and for bids and for making contract for said lateral sewer; also providing for the levying against the abutting lots according to the front-footage thereof along the line of said sewer, special assessments to pay the cost of constructing the same.

Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 1. That a lateral sewer district to be known as lateral sewer district G 1, be formed from blocks 4, 5, 12 and 13 of Miller's Addition to the city of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska.

Section 2. That a lateral sewer be constructed of ten inch sewer pipes at the proper depth and on a grade required by the present sewer system of said city, commencing where the center
