The sudden rise of the Santa Catarina river inundated the town of Monterey, Mexico, Saturday, snuffing out the life of four hundred people and destroying property valued at from one to two million dollars. The people drowned were of the poorer class.

Judges Fawcett, Barnes and Sedgwick, who were nominated for supreme judges at the republican primaries, are men of high character, able jurists and their fitness appeals with unquestioned force to the best citizenship of the state regardless of party alignment or affiliation. RAILROAD NOTES.

Tom McGovern has gone to Fairbury to accept a position in the Rock Island shops.

The branch train yesterday took out a string of stock cars to accommodate valley shippers who are now sending their cattle to market in large numbers.

Colonel Cody to Honor Old Comrades.

A dispatch from Columbus to the Bee says: Over twenty-six years ago the Buffalo Bill exhibition of frontier life, which will be in this city next Friday, organized and started from Columbus to make its first appearance in Omaha and naturally a number of those connected with it were from this city, among whom were the celebrated white chief of the Pawnees, Major Frank North, Captain Fred Matthews and George Clothier, all frontier Indian fighters. These members of the original outfit have passed away and are buried in the Columbus Cemetery. At 9 a. m. on the day that the show is here, the band and members of the company will form at the grounds and march to the cemetery, where a memorial service will be held in honor of the former comrades of Colonel Cody. The service will be conducted by Dean Bascher of Omaha, who was a personal friend of many members of the organization.  
Buffalo Bill has a soft spot in his heart for Columbus and the men who assisted in building up his show and in his day of prosperity he stops long enough to pay a tribute of respect to the old time plannemen of his pioneer days in Nebraska.
