Little Enthusiasm.
The state campaign this year does not awaken any particular enthusiasm. People are interested, of course, but in the selection of supreme judges and regents of the state university voters do not find any special reason for "tearing their shirts," even though the democrats have sought to project a "non-partisan" issue into the canvas. And speaking of non-partism, about all there is to it is that a real genuine "non-partisan" is a democrat who votes for the democratic candidates and wants a republican to do the same. Doubtless a small proportion of republicans will vote for some of the democrats for supreme judge, and a mighty few democrats will reciprocate, and that is just about where the campaign begins and ends.—Kearney Hub.

Thompson Likes the Opinion.
Attorney General Thompson is highly pleased with the opinion rendered in the supreme court in the Sibley express case, whereby the express companies are enjoined from charging more than 75 per cent of the rates in effect January 1, 1907, hereafter. He speaks highly of Judge Barnes and said this regarding the inconspicuous work of the state railway commission: "Much credit is also due the Nebraska state railway commission, by reason of its order requiring the express companies to make monthly reports of their business in Nebraska. It secured the data by which the state was able to show, by actual demonstration, that the rates fixed by the statute were remunerative. It is doubtful if this could have been shown but for the faithful work of the railway commission." No intimation of what the express companies will do has been received in Lincoln. It is presumed that the companies may appeal to the United States supreme court. However, the cut rates must be kept in effect until a higher tribunal renders a decision and the express companies cannot, for the present at least, gain anything by going to the higher courts.

Why State Can't Advertise.
State Labor Commissioner Will M. Maupin told the members of the Omaha Ad club why Nebraska has not been better advertised, at the regular fortnightly noon meeting of the club. "Kansas," said he, "has two bureaus, with twenty-six employes and an annual appropriation of \$102,000. Nebraska has the state labor commissioner and one stenographer and an annual outlay of \$2,500. "We harvest more wheat per capita than does Kansas and more corn per acre than any other state. The Nebraska hen gives a product annually worth \$7,000,000 more than the total gold and silver from the mines of Colorado. Omaha is the greatest butter market in the world and two years from now its prices will be quoted instead of those at Elgin. After stating these and other impressive facts regarding the agricultural resources of Nebraska, which the speaker said were far and away ahead of Kansas, he proceeded to explain why these facts are not better known. The reason in short lay in the niggardly way in which the legislature has provided for publicity. Maupin closed with a plea to the Omaha Ad club to help make the next legislature do something along this line.—Omaha Bee.

General Inspection.
A general inspection of the Union Pacific shops over the entire system will be begun at Ogden on October 1st, and will be carried on eastward. This inspection is conducted by the superintendents of the various divisions and districts and is very thorough. Prizes are given to the shops which are found to be in the best condition. Shop foremen are now preparing for the inspection here by putting their buildings and machinery in first-class condition. Several gangs of men are busy plastering and painting in different shops, and others are replacing broken panes of glass. This will be followed by a general house-cleaning, and arrangement of all tools and machines, which will be put in their proper positions and well cleaned and oiled.—Cheyenne Tribune.

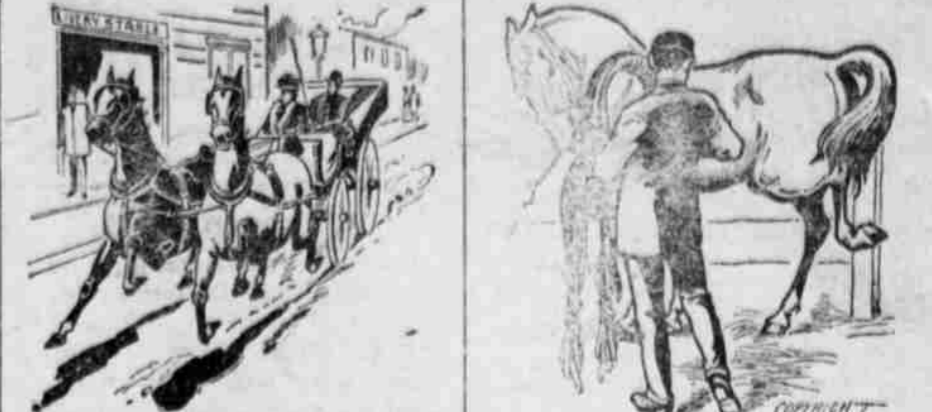
