Find Men at Fault.

An investigation of the wreck which occurred at Odessa Tuesday was held at Grand Island Wednesday, and from the Grand Island Independent we clip the following:

Superintendents Cahill, Likert, Schermerhorn and Supervisor of Signals, Grant and J. F. Rourke, councilmen and president of the Grand Island cannery factory, were the members of the board of inquiry in this case, convened for the purpose of fixing the responsibility. Their finding is as follows:

Conductor William Burke and Engineer A. Lidell, in charge of work extra 1612, violated rule 99 by occupying the main track on the time of train No. 54 without protection. Engineer F. Bowen in charge of engine 1866, train 54, violated rule 304 of the General Block Signal rules. This provides that in case of foggy weather, as was the case on the morning of the accident, the train should be under control. Conductor H. C. Gillespie of train No. 54 did not use ordinary care or judgment in not cautioning his engineer relative to the speed the train was making in foggy weather.
