Something About Mumps.

In view of the fact that many people are very ignorant on the subject of mumps and that many false ideas are held in regard to it and that much harm may result to the people of the community on account of such ignorance and false ideas, I take this method of giving the public the main facts in regard to the disease and its complications. Summed up the intelligence which should be spread in regard to this disease amounts to this.

1. Mumps is contagious
2. Mumps is infectious
3. Mumps may be carried by a third person or by fomites (garments, carpets, letters, etc)
4. Mumps may cause, or be accompanied by complications which may cripple or cause the death of the victim or cause him or her to lose the power of procreation.

Dr. Stephen Smith Professor of Diseases of Children in the Bellevue Hospital Medical College in his book on children gives an instance where the disease was carried from one family to another by a physician and another case in which the disease was carried by bedding in which the patient with mumps had slept. He says the disease is highly contagious.

Dr. L. Emmet Holt, professor of diseases of children in the college of Physicians and Surgeons (Columbia University), New York in his book on infancy and childhood says, "Mumps is spread by contagion, it is known to have been carried by a third party and even by clothing. The disease is undoubtedly communicable for several days after the swelling has subsided; and for safety a case should be isolated for three weeks from the beginning of symptoms or at least ten days after the swelling has disappeared. Holt gives as the complications that may accompany or follow mumps: inflammation and destruction of testes or ovaries, inflammation of the kidney (Bright's Disease), paralysis of the face, neuritis, (inflammation of nerves,) pus formation in the glands, gangrene of glands, these cases were fatal, pneumonia, meningitis, and inflammation of the heart covering and lining (pericarditis and endocarditis,) bleeding into the internal ear sometimes occurs and Pierce in the Manchester Chronicle, 1885, reports forty cases of deafness following mumps, most of this loss of hearing was permanent.

Prof. C. G. Kerley, professor of diseases of children, in the New York Polyclinic, in his recent work on children says mumps is a contagious disease. Forchimer, Professor of Medicine in the Ohio Medical College says in his book on internal disease. The patient should be kept away from others for a period of two weeks after the swelling has developed. Mumps is very contagious. He enumerates the complications given by Holt. Anders in his book on Practice of Medicine says, "mumps is highly contagious, is communicated principally by the breath and exhalations. It may be carried by a third person or by fomites (objects or garments, etc.) He mentions the complications given from Holt and adds arthritis, (inflammation of the joints,) to the list. In the American Text Book on diseases of children we find attention drawn to the same list of possible complications with the addition of two cases reported by P. Smith which were followed by insanity. This book states that "mothers should understand that the disease is always to be avoided if possible."

H. J. Wolcott in the American Journal of Medical Sciences Dec. '99, reports a case of mumps in a man 99 years of age who before the development of the disease probable came in contact in church with persons in whose family mumps existed. Dr. Sajous says in his work on medicine that it may be carried by a third person. Keen in his Surgery mentions necrosis of the cheek and resulting disfigurement as a complication of mumps. Four issues of the British Medical Journal during 1908 report cases of inflammation of the pancreas as a complication of mumps. An inflammatory condition of the pancreas is a common cause of diabetes the significance of this complication should be noted.
