

Coming at a time when the "high cost of living" is the topic discussed by almost every consumer, the Federation of Nebraska Retailers intend to devote much time to problems which tend to increase the price which the retailer must exact in order to make even a small profit. Co-operative plans of handling produce, credit systems which eliminate bad accounts, and legislation which will benefit the general merchant are among the topics most prominent on the three days' program.

If an organized effort is now under way among the democrats to deprive Mr. Bryan of his national leadership, it is only the inevitable outcome of his declaration on county option. Before he took a stand on that question he had been dismissed as a further presidential possibility by the members of his party at Washington. His present attitude makes it appear settled that he can no longer be looked upon as a safe leader and he will be ignored accordingly. All this means that Mr. Bryan's activities for several years must be devoted to the discussion of moral rather than strictly political issues. But that will not prevent him from exerting a profound influence upon the thought of the people and the course of their politics.-Lincoln Journal.
