The KITCHEN CABINET

THE study of home problems may be made of no less cultural value than the study of art or literature, and of much more immediate value.

Kitchen Gardening.

If one realized the health and pleasure, not to say profit in dollars and cents one may get out of a few yards of garden more people would be busy this spring getting in their garden seeds.

The variety and abundance of good things that may be raised on a few square feet of ground is truly surprising. Every inch of soil may be used, as the fertilizers now on the market can be obtained suitable for any kind of soil.

In a small garden one cannot raise corn or potatoes enough to supply the table for any length of time, but there are so many small vegetables and greens that are only good when freshly picked which may be easily grown and fresh seed sown all summer.

The ground should not be worked while it is very wet; it is best to wait for it to dry out. When the soil is ready for the seeds sow them and press the earth firmly down upon them. If this is not done the warm days of sunshine will quickly dry out the soil, shrivel the seeds and all of the vitality is lost. The same precaution should be taken when transplanting. After the plants are firmly set and earth firmly pressed around them, water freely.

Begin to weed before the weeds appear; that is, turn over and cultivate the soil around the young plants; this destroys the first tender seeds and the weeding process is much lightened. The coarser vegetables, except a few beets, should be excluded from a small garden because of lack of space.

Early peas, lettuce, a small bed of parsley, spinach, Swiss chard, onions and a dozen tomato plants, with two or three cucumber vines will keep one in fresh vegetables all summer. A few beans take up but small space and seed peas may be planted several times in the same place, giving a succession of this favorite vegetable. Tomato, cauliflower, celery and cabbage plants may be bought ready for setting out, which saves the bother of raising them from seed.

A few herbs, for seasoning, like sage, thyme and marjoram, will stock the household for a year.

Little Economies.

Darn hose at toe and heel before they are worn. This may be done on the wrong side, using the long darning stitch and the stockings will last very much longer.

Use a spatula for scraping out dishes, saving the cost of the knife in materials in a few weeks.

Try using wooden spoons of small size for stirring; they are much easier on the hands.

Prune Dessert.

Make a cake of one cupful of sugar, half a cupful of butter, two eggs, one half cupful of milk and two cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Flavor with grated lemon rind and bake in a large sheet. Cover with a layer of cooked prunes well sweetened and flavored with a teaspoonful of lemon juice. Serve with whipped cream.

Sugar Pie.

One cupful of brown sugar, one cupful of granulated sugar, one-half cupful of flour, 1½ cupfuls of cold water, one teaspoonful of vanilla. Pour into the crust which has been previously prepared. Cut into small pieces one tablespoonful of butter and scatter them evenly over the top. Bake in a moderate oven for 20 minutes.

Spiced Prunes.

Use the juice from spiced peaches or pears. Soak prunes until the stones may be removed, then drop them into the hot juice; simmer until the prunes are tender. Remove the prunes and boil the juice until thick, then pour over the prunes. Serve with meat.

Date Pie.

Bake a single crust, fill it with stewed dates that have been chopped, sweetened and mixed with one cupful of sweetened flavored whipped cream. Cover the top with spoonfuls of whipped cream and chopped nuts mixed.

Eggnog.

Beat one egg, add a tablespoonful of vinegar, one cupful of milk and a grating of nutmeg. Heat the milk hot and pour it over the beaten egg. This is a wholesome strengthening drink and taken hot is good for sick or well.

Veal Oysters.

Cut a veal round steak into small pieces the size of an oyster. Rub over each piece a mixture of salt, pepper and a little powdered meat. Dip in egg, then in cracker crumbs, and fry.

Left Overs.

Use cold cooked macaroni mixed with minced boiled ham; wet with a thick white sauce, make into croquettes and fry as usual. Serve with tomato or white sauce seasoned with cheese.

For a cauliflower salad, break into bits the cooked cauliflower and arrange on a dish, in the center put a cup of cold cooked peas, sprinkle with salt and paprika and chill well. Serve with French dressing or mayonnaise.

A nice little breakfast dish is prepared with a half-inch of hash, moistened well with gravy; put into individual dishes and when very hot, draw out of the oven and drop in a raw egg in each, return to the oven until they are set.

A pineapple pudding may be prepared as follows: Butter a baking dish and line it with stale cake; add one cupful of pineapple and a cupful of the juice; cover with a plate and bake for an hour, uncover and put on a meringue made of one egg white, and two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Brown in the oven, and serve with pineapple sauce or cream.

Halibut with Milk.

Take a thick slice of halibut, cover with sweet milk and bake until the fish is tender. Remove the milk, season and thicken for a white sauce to serve with the fish.

Salt mackerel is very nice served this way after being freshened. Rich, thick cream may be used instead of milk, added just long enough to become hot.

Cheese Pie.

Line a deep pie plate with a good pastry and fill with a mixture of two cupfuls of cottage cheese rubbed soft with rich cream, half a cup of sugar, the juice and rind of a lemon, half a tablespoonful of melted butter and three eggs beaten light. Bake in a slow oven.

White Loaf Cake.

Whites of eight eggs, 2½ cupfuls of cake flour, three-quarters cupful butter, one-half cupful water, 1½ cupfuls of granulated sugar, two heaping teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Cream butter and sugar, pour water on top of butter and sugar, pour slightly whipped whites on top of water (don't stir water in butter and sugar), then add flour and baking powder sifted three times. Add extract. Beat hard until fine as velvet. When cake is done it will feel firm under finger tip touch.

Spanish Dish.

Put a layer of thinly sliced potatoes in a buttered baking dish, add a layer of thinly sliced meat of any kind, then a layer of sliced onion, (one onion is sufficient); one cup of tomato, bake in a moderate oven 45 minutes; just ten minutes before serving, add half a cupful of cooked peas; these will garnish the dish. Serve in the dish in which they are baked.

Nut Bread.

Three cupfuls of sifted flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half cupful of sugar, 1½ cupfuls of milk, two eggs, well beaten, one cupful of nuts chopped, one teaspoonful salt; put in two small bread pans, let stand 20 minutes, and bake in slow oven 45 minutes.

Rice Pudding.

To three quarts of fresh milk add one-half cup of raw rice washed clean, two cups of granulated sugar, and two tablespoonfuls vanilla. Bake slowly three hours, stirring first hour often, then let crust form. Will be like thick cream when cold. Will serve eight people.

Rice Mash.

Take equal parts of roast beef, chopped finely, and well-seasoned and boiled rice. Mix thoroughly, put in buttered baking dish, cover with tomato sauce, well flavored with onion and bay leaf. Cover all with buttered bread crumbs and bake about half an hour.

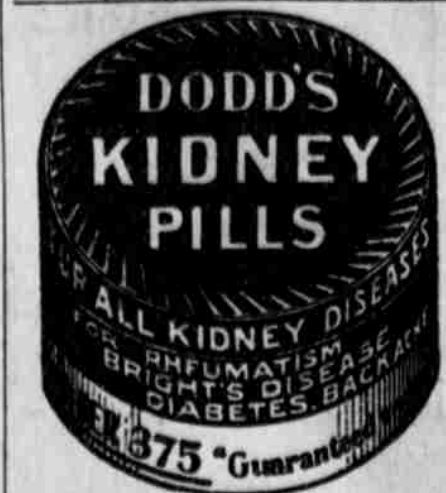

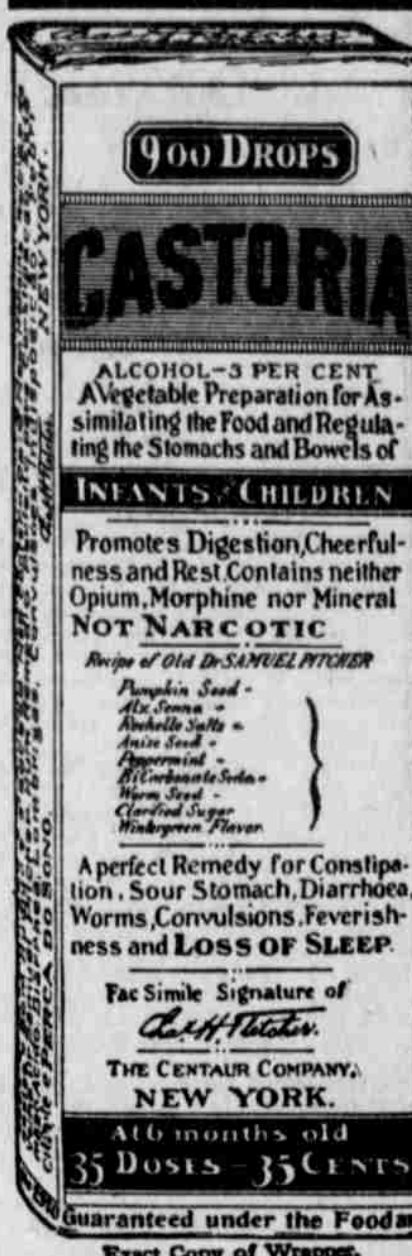
