Dedicate Lincoln School.

The Lincoln school building in the Third ward was formally dedicated yesterday afternoon and evening. In the afternoon the children, under the direction of the six teachers, rendered an interesting program of songs and recitations before a large audience of patrons. In the evening an audience that filled the auditorium—probably three hundred—gathered and listened to addresses by E. T. Tramp, who presided as chairman, Miss Smith, principal of the school, Victor VonGoetz, W. C. Elder, F. E. Bullard and Supt. Tout. These addresses contained many good points, especially where it was urged by several of the speakers that a more hearty co-operation of teacher and patron be had, and that patrons more frequently visit the school and watch the daily work of the pupils. The addresses were interspersed with selections by the Eighth grade chorus, a mandolin selection by Louise Welborn and a vocal duet by June Burger and Louise Welborn.

Following the program the teachers employed in the building served punch and wafers.

There are 275 pupils attending the Lincoln school, which is evidence that the erection of the new building was a real necessity.

Graduation.

A departure is to be made this year in the conduct of the High School graduating exercises from the custom of the past few years. Instead of a speaker from out of town delivering the address to the graduates the plan of the exercises is a return to the type of exercises which formerly held sway. The music will be worthy of the occasion. The Graduation chorus will render the numbers. This chorus was organized for the express purpose of providing music for this occasion and has been at work for some weeks. There will be six short addresses on the program. Four of these are by members of the class and are selected as follows. One member of the class selected by the class, one member selected by the High School faculty, the member of the class who has the highest standing (valedictorian) and the president of the class. Then one speaker was selected by the alumni of the High School and one member of the board will present the diplomas. This exercise will be held in the Keith Theatre and an admission of twenty-five cents will be charged.

Analysis of Water.

Mayor Patterson has received from the Union Pacific a vertical drawing of the new well recently put down at this place by the Union Pacific, together with a statement of the conditions found and a analysis of the water. This analysis is a most important one to the people of North Platte, for it not only includes the water from the new well but from other wells. The total solids in the water from the new wells at a depth of 215 feet is 13.27, from the old U. P. wells the percentage is 27.40, from the Peniston well—196 feet deep—the percentage is 13.42, while the total solids from the present wells of the water company is 36.85, or more than double the percentage in the new Union Pacific well.

Water was pumped from the new well at the rate of twenty gallons per minute, and in four hours pumping the water was lowered ten feet in the casing.

This report and analysis is of much benefit to the city in view of the proposed new water plant.

E. R. Goodman spent the greater part of last week in the country south of Brady hustling fire insurance on farm property. Practically all farmers and ranchmen in Lincoln county carry insurance on their buildings and stock thus showing good judgment. In speaking of crop appearances in that section, Mr. Goodman said small grain looked fair, a good part of the winter wheat having been more or less damaged by the severe winter weather. The first cutting of alfalfa will be light on account of the cold weather of the past month.

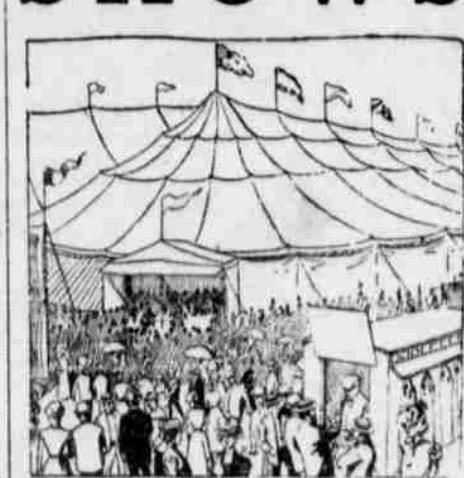
