#### **TUESDAY MAY 31, 1910.**

At Indianapolis Sunday a driver named Harroun in a Marmon car covered a distance of 200 miles in two hours, forty-six minutes and thirty-one seconds, breaking all previous records for that distance. On the same day another car made ten miles in eight minutes and eight seconds. This is certainly desperate driving.

A new world's record for big gun shooting, which incidentally emphasizes the superiority of United States naval marksmenship, has just been made by the new battleship South Carolina. NORTH WESTERN With its forward turret twelve-inch guns it made sixteen "bull's-eye target" hits out of sixteen shots in four minutes and fifty-one seconds.

Last Sonday Glenn H. Curtis flew from Albany to New York city in a nacroplane winning the \$10,000 prize offered by the New York World. He covered the distance of 131 miles in two hours and thirty minutes, and came to earth as calmly and lightly as a pigeon. His average speed for the distance-54.06 miles an hour-surpasses any record ever made by an aeroplane in long distance flight, and in its entirety his feat perhaps eclipses anything man has attempted in an heavier-than-air machine.

It was naturally to be expected, the railroads of the country, in making an advance of freight rates, claim that it is made necessary by a general advance in the wages of employes, which increase was made necessary by the higher cost of living. 

The number of surprise tests made on the Pennsylvania (twenty-six divisions) during the past year is 3000,000, or an average of over 800 a day. In about one-fourth of 1 per cent of the cases faults were detected, but none of these was sufficient to do any damage. Eight divisions showed perfect records. In the coming summer the city of Trenton will have upward of 2,200 boys playing uniformed base ball under municipal control. The directors are Albert Bratton. at one time one of the best known base ball and basket ball players in New Jersey, and William Haney.

The report of the congressional committee appointed to investigate the Ballinger-Pinchot controversy will, in all likelihood, be published about the middle of July. There may be two reports, one signed by Senator Nelson of Minnesota, chairman of the joint comthe other by the insurgents and democrats on the committee. It is generally believed that Secretary Ballinger, of the Department of the Interior, will be entirely exonerated of wrong doing and Gifford Pinchot, Louis R. Glavis and others among the members will be criticised for what the committee may term "their misguided zeal." Nevertheless the opinion prevails that Secretary Ballinger's resignation will be in the hands of President Taft before November. It is reported that Secretary Ballinger has already intimated to his friends that he thought of resigning, but he declares he would never resign under fire.
