Exports of farm products from the United States have increased from an average of \$150,000,000 a year in the five year period from 1851 to 1855 to more than \$1,000,000,000 in 1908, according to the department of agriculture. The increase in exports has been greater than the increase in population. In 1851 to 1855 the average value per capita of agricultural exports was \$5.85; in 1901-05 it was \$10.85. Exports of packing house products have increased from \$10,000,000 in the 1851-55 period to \$196,000,000 in 1908, the principal items in this group being pork, beef and oleo oil. Since 1905 there has been and oleo oil. Since 1905 there has been a decline in the exports of beef, but the balance of the trade favors foreign countries by nearly \$200,000,000 in the year ending June 30, 1909, according to the advance sheet of the report of the New York chamber of commerce.
