June 29, 1910.

Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment, present Commissioners Streitz and Walter and county clerk.

Bond of James Bechan, Jr., road overseer in District No. 27, is hereby approved.

L. H. Larson is hereby appointed overseer of District No. 20. Permission is granted the Farnam

telephone exchange and Moorefield farm and ranch telephone company to erect poles and wires on public roads of Lincoln county, Nebraska, providing such poles are set two feet within the outer boundary line of such public roads and not placed to interfere with road crossings; the boundary line of county roads to be determined by a competent surveyor.
