An Ordinance. An ordinance requiring the construction of sidewalks as follows: Beginning at the curb line on the south side of A Street, from thence in a southerly direction along the east side of south Chestnut street along and in front of the west side of lots five (5), six (6), seven (7) and eight (8), in Block two (2), Peniston's addition to the City of North Platte, Lincoln county, Nebraska, to the curb line on the north side of B Street and beginning at the curb line on the south side of B Street, from thence in a southerly direction along the east side of south Chestnut street, along and in front of the west side of lots five (5), six (6), seven (7) and eight (8) in the North Platte Town Lot Company's Addition to North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, to the curb line on the east side of North Grant Ave.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska: Section 1. That a lateral sewer district, to be known as lateral sewer district "G 3" be formed from blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' Addition to the city of North Platte and block 6 of the South Park addition to the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 2. That a lateral sewer be constructed of 10 inch sewer pipes at the proper depth and on a grade required by the present sewer system of said city, commencing where the dividing line between lots 2 and 3 in block 1 intersect the main sewer of said block, running thence in a southerly direction on a line between said lots 2 and 3 and on the center line of the alley of said blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' addition and block 6 of South Park addition to the City of North Platte where the center line of said alley intersects with the south line of said block 6 South Park addition; to be constructed of sewer pipes 10 inches in diameter with proper flush tanks, man holes and proper appliances; providing for an estimate of the cost thereof and for bids and for making a contract for said lateral sewer; also providing for the levying against the abutting lots according to the front footage thereof, along the line of said sewer, special assessments to pay the cost of constructing the same.

Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska: Section 1. That a lateral sewer district, to be known as lateral sewer district "G 3" be formed from blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' addition to the city of North Platte and block 6 of the South Park addition to the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

Section 2. That a lateral sewer be constructed of 10 inch sewer pipes at the proper depth and on a grade required by the present sewer system of said city, commencing where the dividing line between lots 2 and 3 in block 1 intersect the main sewer of said block, running thence in a southerly direction on a line between said lots 2 and 3 and on the center line of the alley of said blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' addition and block 6 of South Park addition to the City of North Platte where the center line of said alley intersects with the south line of said block 6 of South Park addition to the city of North Platte, together with the necessary man holes, flush tanks and appliances along the line of said proposed lateral sewer.

Section 3. That the engineer of said city, at once prepare and file with the clerk thereof, an estimate of the total cost of said proposed lateral sewer. Section 4. That after said estimate is made and filed as herein provided, that the clerk of said city proceed at once to advertise in manner and form required by law, for bids for the construction of said lateral sewer and appliances, reserving to said city the right to reject any and all bids therefor.

Section 5. If an approved bid be made for said work, that a contract therefor be entered into by the mayor of said city, attested by the clerk, with the necessary provisions protecting the interests of said city, upon the contractor furnishing a bond in sufficient amount for the faithful performance of the said contract.

Section 6. To pay the costs of construction of said lateral sewer, flush tanks, man holes and appliances, a special assessment shall be levied according to law against the lots abutting upon the line of said lateral sewer, according to the front footage thereof.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication. Passed and approved this 5th day of July, 1910. THOS. C. PATTERSON, Mayor. Attest: CHAS. F. TEMPLE, City Clerk.

the curb line on the East side of North Grant Ave., all of which sidewalk shall be constructed on a line as provided for in the general sidewalk ordinance of said City, passed and approved on the 21st day of June 1906. And all of said sidewalk shall be constructed of hard brick, stone flagging or broken stone, and coarse gravel and cement, and shall be boarded at the edges with permanent material in manner as provided by the general ordinance of said City, passed and approved the 21st day of June 1906.

Section 2. That the owners of the lots along which this sidewalk so established by this ordinance, as described in Section One hereof, are hereby required to construct said sidewalk without delay, and have the same completed within 30 days from the publication or service of notice as provided by the general sidewalk ordinance, passed and approved on the 21st day of June 1906. And if any of the owners shall fail to comply with this ordinance and notice when given, the city authorities shall proceed with the construction of said sidewalk, at the expense of the delinquent owners of said lots as provided in said general sidewalk ordinance, passed and approved on the 21st day of June, 1906, and the amount of costs and expenses for the construction of said sidewalk and collection of the same, shall be collected by special assessment or tax levied against the lot or lots along which said city is required to construct the same.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage according to law.

An Ordinance.

Providing for the construction of a lateral sewer district, to be known as lateral sewer district "G 3" to consist of blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' Addition to the city of North Platte and block 6 of South Park addition to the city of North Platte; said lateral sewer commencing where the dividing line between lots 2 and 3 in block 1 intersect the main sewer of said block, running thence in a southerly direction on the line between said lots 2 and 3 and on the center line of the alley of said blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' Addition to the city of North Platte and said block 6 of South Park addition to the city of North Platte, where the center of said alley intersects with the south line of said block 6 South Park addition; to be constructed of sewer pipes 10 inches in diameter with proper flush tanks, man holes and proper appliances; providing for an estimate of the cost thereof and for bids and for making a contract for said lateral sewer; also providing for the levying against the abutting lots according to the front footage thereof, along the line of said sewer, special assessments to pay the cost of constructing the same.

Be it ordained by the mayor and city council of the city of North Platte, Nebraska: Section 1. That a lateral sewer district, to be known as lateral sewer district "G 3" be formed from blocks 1 and 2 of Banks' addition to the city of North Platte and block 6 of the South Park addition to the city of North Platte, Nebraska.

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Section 3.
