or liability to which the corporation is at any time to subject itself shall not exceed two-thirds of the paid up capital

The date of the commencement of said corporation shall be the first day of July, 1910, and shall continue for a period of twenty-five years, unless sooner dissolved by law. The affairs of said corporation are to

be managed by a board of directors consisting of not less than three nor more than five, and a president and a secretary-treasurer.
