The democratic tie-up in the state is Dahman and Hitchcock and Shallenberger and Metcalfe. Which do you think will win out at the primaries next Tuesday?

At the Shallenberger headquarters the prediction is given out that he will win the democratic nomination by a large majority. There is nothing to indicate, they say, that Dahman will make a strong run.

Mayor Gaynor, of New York, who was shot in the head Tuesday while on a vessel about to leave for Europe, will probably recover. The man doing the shooting was a discharged city employe.

The Burlington crop report predicts a corn crop in Nebraska of about seventy per cent of the average. This prediction is based on the condition of the crop along the Burlington lines, which cover a big section of the state.

This paragraph from the Omaha Bee is good advice: No republican should throw his vote away on Mayor "Jim" in the coming primary. Governor Shallenberger has the nomination nailed down, and republicans should vote in their own party column to strengthen their own ticket all along the line.

R. O. Ross, of Lexington, who filed petitions as a democratic, republican and populist candidate for congress, spent a day or two in town this week getting acquainted with the people. Mr. Ross is not considered a formidable candidate by the other gentlemen who are after the nomination.

John Wilson had a quarrel with his father at Tecumseh, Neb., thirty-five years ago and ran away from home, and had not since seen his parents. The other day he returned to Tecumseh to claim the estate of his now dead parents valued at \$30,000. He established his claim and the court awarded him the property.

Lincoln county will pay \$24,658.30 as its share of running the state government for the year 1910, in other words that is the total state tax that has been assessed by the state board against the property in the county. Last year the tax was about one thousand dollars greater.

The Wall Street Journal, which keeps pretty close tabs on the proposed expenditures of railroads in the way of improvements, says the Union Pacific will build ten new shops. No point on the Union Pacific system needs a new shop more than North Platte. May we hope to see one of the ten located at this division terminal?

The state board of assessment completed the equalization as between counties Tuesday and found the assessed value of the state to be \$411,958,354, an increase of nearly \$13,000,000 over last year. This assessed value is one-fifth of the real value. The assessed value of Lincoln county this year is \$4,931,661, an increase of \$253,307 over 1909.

With favorable weather conditions and the delay of frost until a later date than the average, late corn will make a good crop. The consensus of opinion is that the corn crop in Lincoln county will be seventy-five per cent of the average crop. This being true, the farmers of Lincoln county will not be as nearly bad off as was thought a few weeks ago.

If you are a democrat or a republican you can vote at the primary for any candidate or candidates of the opposite party, but in doing so you forfeit the right to vote for any candidate of your own party. Remember this! You can not vote for democratic candidate or candidates, or for a republican candidate or candidates, and have your ballot counted. Voting for candidates of more than one party invalidates your ballot. Keep this in mind.

The humdrum of army life among the western posts has been broken by orders from the government to send out the troops to fight the uncontrollable forest fires in Idaho, Washington, Oregon and California. Having established this precedent, the Lincoln Journal suggests that next summer when harvest hands are unobtainable, that the government send the troops to help out the farmers.

Fred George, of Brady, administrator of the estate of Fred George, Sr., has disposed of the property of the estate and Judge Grimes has ordered a partition of the assets which in round numbers amount to \$38,000. This sum will be divided equally between the seven heirs.
