Contracts to Deliver Goods.

Chas. A. Moore, formerly foreman at the stockyards, has made a contract with four of the grocery houses to deliver goods, and in making this contract takes over part of the delivery outfits. The four firms who have made contracts with Mr. Moore are: Wilcox Dept. Store, Rush Mercantile Co., Greeson and Tramp. Under this arrangement goods will be delivered more promptly and with less cost to the sellers. For instance when goods are to be delivered in the extreme portions of the city instead of one or two deliveries from each individual grocery, the same wagon will deliver at the same time the orders to that part of the city from all four of the dealers. It can readily be seen that this means more prompt delivery, for it would be natural for a grocer upon receiving an order from a distant point to delay for a short time the delivery in expectancy of further orders from the same sections; and it can also be readily seen that in delivering a wagon load of goods the percentage of cost is much less than delivering a box of matches, as is often the case. There are thirty-six miles of streets in North Platte. To deliver goods on all the streets means a mighty amount of daily driving.

In making a schedule of deliveries, which is printed elsewhere, and in doubling up on deliveries, the grocers have certainly adopted a good plan.

The City Primary.

The vote in the city primary was heavier than was expected, the total reaching over 500. The exact vote on the several candidates will not be known until the canvass is made, but the unofficial returns give Burkett a majority of 88 over Whedon for the republican nomination for U. S. senator and Hitchcock a majority of 35 over Metcalf for the same office. For governor Cady led Aldrich 48 votes, and Dahlman had a majority of 82 over Shallenberger. Dahlman's vote was not much of a surprise, as considerable work had been done for him, and his presence here last week influenced some votes. For congressman Kinkaid had 63 votes over Beeman, his closest competitor, and for the same office Dean had 48 majority over the next highest man. For state senator Hoagland received 54 more votes than Stewart. Dr. McCabe received 33 votes for state senator, that number writing his name on the ballots.

Belated returns from the country precincts were received last evening and the official canvass is being made today.

Double Track Grading Complete.

The grading for the second track of Union Pacific between this terminal and Julesburg was completed this week. The Pheldn-Shirley Co., the contractors, are however grading for sidetracks at several places between the two points, but this work will be completed by September. The second track has been ballasted as far west as Birdwood.

Aldrich and Dahlman Lead.

Today's Bee has this to say of the result on governor at the Tuesday primary: Returns from 939 precincts, which include Douglas, Lancaster, Dodge, York, Madison and other populous counties such as Hall, show the following vote on governor as the result of Tuesday's primary election. Aldrich 12,353, Cady 11,384, Dahlman 20,733, Shallenberger 17,156.

This showing includes perhaps two-thirds of the vote that was cast. If this is true, the nomination of Dahlman by the democrats is assured, for Shallenberger will have to have two to one in the remaining precincts in order to win, and it is unlikely that he will run that strong. Between Aldrich and Cady the race is getting very close. While the probabilities are in favor of Aldrich, it is not out of the range of possibility that Cady may overhaul him.

A message to The Bee from its staff correspondent there says: "Governor Shallenberger believes he is nominated, basing his belief on telephone messages he has received from friends out in the state. He has information on sixty-three counties, which he says give him a majority of 71.

"The governor has no information whether the counties are reporting the combined populist and democratic vote for Shallenberger. If this is being done the Shallenberger vote will be cut down the extent of the populist vote which has been counted for him.

Aldrich run well in the state and cut down the big lead that was given Cady in Douglas county. He will probably be nominated, but the final figures will not show a very wide spread between the winner and the loser. Dahlman went out of Douglas with a big lead, which he increased in Lancaster, and the Shallenberger precincts have not been sufficiently numerous to reduce the Dahlman advantage very much. At the rate the returns are showing Dahlman is safely ahead.

Burkett is running far ahead of Whedon and the others for the indorsement for United States senator by the Republicans and Hitchcock has left Reed and Metcalf far in the rear in the race on the Democratic side for the same position.

In the First district, William Hayward defeated Tobey for the nomination for congress, even carrying Tobey's home county, Lancaster, Congressman J. A. Maguire had no opposition for renomination on the Demo-

cratic ticket in the First. In the Second the Republicans nominate Judge A. L. Sutton and the Democrats nominate C. O. Lobeck. In the Third the race between J. F. Boyd and L. G. Brian for the Republican nomination has apparently been determined in favor of Boyd. Congressman James P. Latta was renominated without opposition. In the Fourth C. H. Sloan, Republican, was named without opposition, while the Democratic contest is close between Bailey and Good. On the Democratic side R. D. Sutherland has a lead over Harman in the Fifth, where Congressman Norris was renominated without opposition. In the Sixth contests are being fought on both sides, and the returns from there are very meager, but it is indicated that Congressman M. P. Kinkaid will be renominated by the Republicans.
