Shop and Road News.

Frank McEvoy, who submitted to an operation in Omaha two weeks ago, is expected home tonight.

Engineer Congdon is able to be on the streets today afternoon being confined to the house for ten days with a threatened attack of appendicitis.

Work train engine 1902 and one of the switch engines came together in the yards early yesterday morning. The tank of the former was damaged to some extent and the pilot knocked off of the latter.

It now develops that part of the \$75,000,000 recently appropriated will be used in extending the Union Pacific's North River line through to Medicine Bow. The extension from Northport to Gering will be made this year, and if the money market in 1912 is not too tight the contract will be let from Gering to Medicine Bow. The estimated cost of the line is \$13,000,000.

The Union Pacific expected to place a new time-card in effect last Sunday the principal change being a night train out of Omaha. This was thwarted, however, by the people living between Columbus and Omaha objecting to setting back the departure of train No. 23 from afternoon to night, and took the matter up with the railway commission. The hearing took place at Lincoln yesterday but the result has not been learned.

The passenger engines on the Union Pacific, and especially those in service between North Platte and Grand Island, are in pretty bad shape, and freight engines are being pressed into service daily. This is through no fault of Dist. Foreman Berry, it is simply a refusal on the part of his superior officers to allow needed work done on passenger engines, the machinery of which is in good shape but the fire boxes are in awfully bad condition. There are today five or six of the 100 class practically out of use on account of their fire boxes.

Dies Following Operation.

Mrs. M. I. McCarty died at the Physician & Surgeons' hospital Saturday night following an operation for the removal of a tumor Thursday, in which operation the hospital physicians were assisted by a specialist from Omaha. The tumorous growth was of long standing, making the operation a critical one, and though the patient rallied from the immediate effect, her weakened condition, which had existed prior to the operation, could not counteract the shock to the system.

The deceased, who resided in Wood River, was the wife of M. I. McCarty, the proprietor of the North Side drug store and the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Bowen, who have been residents of North Platte for a year or more. She had visited in the city a number of times, and those who formed her acquaintance speak very highly of her, and in her home town of Wood River she was respected and held in high esteem by all, being a leader in church, club and social circles.

The funeral was held from the home of her parents this afternoon, Rev. Larimer, of Wood River, conducting the services, assisted by members of the Eastern Star, of which order she was a member.

Harold Chamberlain Dies.

Harold Chamberlain, seventeen year old son of Dist. Supt. Chamberlain, died at an Omaha hospital Saturday night following an operation performed for appendicitis a week before. The boy had been troubled with appendicitis for about two years, and the recurrence of the disease being more frequent, an operation became necessary.

Following the receipt of the telegram Rev. Chamberlain and other members of the family went to Omaha Sunday noon.

The remains will be taken to Malvern, Iowa, for interment, at which place the mother was buried but a couple of months ago.

Surely Rev. Chamberlain has been called upon to drink the cup of sorrow during the past few months, and to him the sympathy of our people go forth.

The contract for grading the extension of the Union Pacific's North Platte valley line from Northport to Gering, which was awarded to Kilpatrick Bros. & Collins week before last and upon which work was to begin at once, has been held up in New York. There is rumor of a trackage arrangement of some kind between the Union Pacific and the Burlington which has delayed positive orders to proceed with the Northport-Gering extension.
