Aged Man Suicides.

Prosper A. Schlosse, aged seventy-eight years, committed suicide at the home of his son, who lives thirty miles southwest of this city and a few miles from Wallace, about ten o'clock Tuesday night. With his son and family the old gentleman had attended church services in a nearby school house, but he had left and gone home before the services were completed. When the family returned he could not be found, but a search revealed his dead body in the attic of the sod house. He had ended life by means of a 22-calibre revolver, the ball entering the right temple and ranging downward emerged under the tongue.

Sheriff Miltonberger and Coroner Longley were notified and going to the scene in an automobile held an inquest, the verdict being death by his own hand. The evidence at the inquest showed that Schlosse was somewhat childish and at times did peculiar things. While at church preceding his death he handed his pocketbook to the minister saying, "You take one dollar and give the other ten to the priest"—he was a Frenchman by birth and of the Catholic faith. The minister returned the money to the coroner.

The Schlosse family have lived in the county for a number of years.

Bishop Beecher to Locate in Kearney.
Rev. C. F. Chapman received a letter from Bishop Geo. A. Beecher Wednesday in which he stated that he had selected Kearney as the see city—his residence and headquarters.

Members of the local church and citizens generally had hoped that Bishop Beecher would select North Platte as his residence, and that he has decided not to do so is a disappointment to all. Had the Bishop decided to locate here arrangements would have been made to purchase or build a suitable residence for him.

Republican City Convention.

Republicans of the city to the number of sixty met in mass convention at the court house Tuesday evening and placed in nomination a city ticket.

The convention was called to order by Chairman Bare and the organization effected by the selection of Bare chairman and R. C. Langford secretary.

The democrats in convention in an adjoining room were willing that each of the two conventions, in order to avoid strife, name a committee and that committee select a non-partisan ticket. This proposition was submitted to the republican convention but was defeated. The convention then proceeded to nominate a ticket with the following result:

Mayor, T. C. Patterson; clerk, Will Otten; treasurer, F. L. Mooney; police judge, D. W. Baker; Members board of education, John Burke and E. T. Tramp.

The representatives of the several wards then held caucuses and placed in nomination the following candidates:

First ward, Edmund Dickey; Second ward, M. E. Crosby; Third ward, Dr. H. C. Brock and J. W. Payne; Fourth, R. L. Douglas, long term, V. VonGoetz short term.

The following were selected as members of the city committee: First ward, A. S. Coates; Second, W. H. C. Woodhurst; Third ward, F. J. Diener; Fourth ward, Paul Meyer, E. H. Evans was elected chairman and Ray C. Langford secretary of the committee.

After authorizing the city committee to fill any vacancies on the ticket that might occur, the convention adjourned.
