Passes to the Beyond.

Sunday night as the clock struck eleven the spirit of Mrs. Katie Brown, that kindly woman so beloved by all, took its flight. For two years Mrs. Brown had been in poor health, the breaking down following a life of wonderful activity, and for several weeks prior to the end the spirit hung in the balance. Dear as she was to the devoted daughters and son, death came as a relief—for she endured intense suffering of body, and that suffering was anguish to those who loved her so well. Mrs. Brown was ready to answer the call of the Master; in her last conscious moments she spoke of the peace which had come to her, "that peace that passeth all understanding"; and in the end the soul left its earthly environments as she calmly slept.

Few are those in North Platte who did not know "Nurse" Brown; there are none who knew but held her in high esteem; she was universally respected by reason of her kindly nature, her christian spirit and the thoroughness of her service in her vocation. Every home she had visited feels that it has lost a friend.

The funeral will be held at the Presbyterian church tomorrow afternoon at 2:30. Rev. Thos. B. Greenlee, of Council Bluffs, will conduct the services, this request having been made by Mrs. Brown.

The deceased was born in Edinboro, Scotland, Sept. 9th, 1838, and was married in that city in 1864. Soon after the marriage they came to Canada where they remained for three years, thence back to Scotland for six months. They then came to the United States and locating in Williamsport, Penna., remained there for eight years, and thence to North Platte, arriving here in 1880. In 1900 Mr. Brown died. She leaves five children, Mrs. Fred Beller of Freewater, Ore., Mrs. Frank Powers, Mrs. Maggie Hall, Mrs. Annie Brown, and Alex Brown, all of this city, also twelve grandchildren, five great grandchildren and one sister in Scotland.

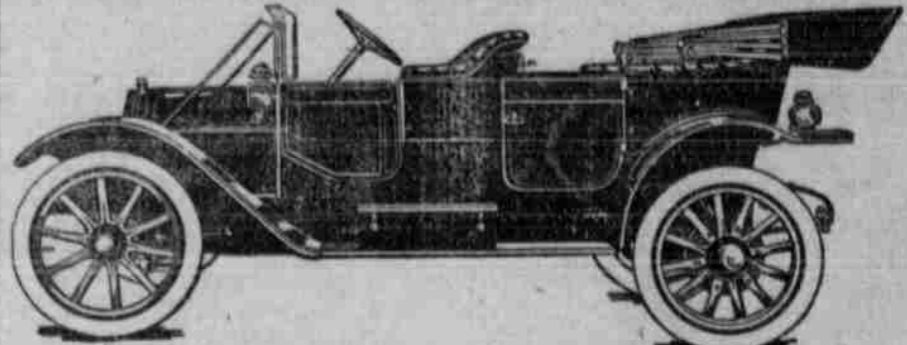
