### Postal Savings System.

**INFORMATION FOR DEPOSITORS**  
1. Depository offices will be open for postal savings business during the regular Money Order hours.  
2. Any person of the age of ten years or over may become a depositor.  
3. The account of a married woman will be free from any control or interference by her husband.  
4. No person shall have more than one account at the same time.  
5. Depositors will receive postal-savings certificates covering the amount of each deposit made.  
6. An account cannot be opened for less than a dollar; fractions of a dollar cannot be deposited, and cannot be withdrawn except as interest.  
7. A person cannot deposit more than one hundred dollars in any calendar month, nor can his account at any time exceed five hundred dollars, exclusive of interest.  
8. In order to save small amounts for deposit, 10c postal-savings cards and postal-savings stamps may be purchased at any depository office. A savings card with nine stamps affixed may be deposited as one dollar.  
9. Interest payable annually, will be allowed upon deposits at the rate of two per cent per annum. Certificates issued on any day of a month commence to draw interest from the first day of following month.  
10. Before accepting a certificate of deposit the depositor must see that both the certificate and the duplicate kept by the postmaster correspond with the amount deposited.  
11. Certificates are valid until paid. The ten year interest table on the back of each certificate is for the information of the depositors and does not limit the life of a certificate to ten years.  
12. A woman who opens an account and afterwards marries must present her savings certificate to the postmaster, who will endorse them as payable in her new name.  
13. Any depositor may withdraw the whole or any part of his deposits, with accrued interest, by surrendering at his depository office savings certificates covering the desired amount.  
14. If the depositor loses any of his certificates, he should immediately notify the postmaster at his depository office.  
15. Postmasters are not permitted to receive postal-savings certificates for safe keeping.  
16. Certificates must be carefully preserved. If they are mutilated or defaced payment may be defaced.

17. Upon the death of a depositor, the balance to his credit may be withdrawn by his duly authorized executor, administrator, or other legal representative.  
18. No person connected with the Post-Office Department or postal service shall disclose the name of any depositor, or give any information concerning his account to any person other than the depositor himself unless directed to do so by the Postmaster General.  
19. Any depositor may under certain conditions, convert the whole or any part of his deposits in sums of twenty, forty, sixty, eighty, one hundred or any multiples of one hundred dollars, up to and including five hundred dollars, into United States coupon or registered bonds, bearing interest at the rate of two and one-half per cent., such bonds to be exempt from all taxes or duties of the United States, as well as from taxation in any form by or under State, Municipal or local authorities.  
20. Farther particulars concerning the Postal Savings System may be obtained at any depository office.  
The above becomes effective at the North Platte Postoffice on Thursday June 1st, 1911.

### The Sanborn Decision.

A Lincoln special to the World-Herald says:  
At no time since the state of Nebraska suffered the temporary defeat of the bank guarantee law at the hands of the appointed federal judges, has the state stood in such peril from federal courts as it does at the present time.  
By merely following the decision of a higher court the district federal judges of Nebraska can wipe out the 2-cent commodity rate law that has saved millions of dollars in passenger fares and freight rates in Nebraska.  
Judge Sanborn of the circuit court of appeals wrote an opinion in the Minnesota rate cases that practically emasculates every state railway commission, so far as its rate making powers are concerned. He, moreover, laid down certain dicta about the calculation of expense and the division of income that would probably show that the Nebraska laws are confiscatory. Being the judge of a circuit in which the federal courts in this state are but a small part it would be the duty and almost certain action of the district federal judges to follow this decision if the Nebraska cases were to be submitted at the present time.  
But before the Sanborn decision is final it must be passed on by the supreme court of the United States; before the railroads know definitely their position the Missouri rate case, also coming in the same judicial circuit, must be passed upon by the higher court; only the law as applied to the Rock Island railroad has been heard fully in this state and the state can reasonably ask that evidence as to the effect of the laws on all of the roads shall be heard before the validity of the law is decided.  
This delay also allows the laws to continue in effect. In Minnesota, where the decision of the federal judge overthrew all the work done by the state, the railroads will put the old 3-cent a mile passenger schedule in effect after July 1st, and will also put through rates back on the old basis.

**Cooney Acquitted.**  
At Kearney Tuesday night a jury brought in a verdict of not guilty in the case of Patrick E. Cooney, charged by the state with the murder of Elmer Mercer on the night of December 21. The jury was out two hours. Four of the most prominent lawyers of that part of the state were engaged by Cooney, while the county attorney and the city attorney of Kearney conducted the prosecution.  
The principals are both men from well known and wealthy families. Cooney is a bartender and Mercer was found dead in front of his saloon with a broken neck and his face bruised. The men had been quarreling a few minutes before Mercer was found.

**The Doings of a Kid.**  
A dispatch from Broken Bow says: The nine year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Sloggett a few weeks ago took a revolver to school, shot at the teacher, and later was found with a stick of dynamite near the school. It is believed his intention was to try to blow up the building. He hid in a warehouse of a local grocery firm recently and threatened to knife the clerk who ordered him out. Sunday morning he broke into a local store, took some tobacco and candy. Clerks, who were in the store at the time hidden, took him to his father, who promises to send the boy to the reform school.

A petition in bankruptcy, exceptional in the matter of the liabilities alleged, has been filed before Referee in Bankruptcy B. H. Paine of Grand Island, by attorneys for Charles B. Reynolds of Kearney. The Kearney man alleges liabilities of \$133,972 with practically no assets. Reynolds is a stockman and dealt largely in sheep. His largest creditor is alleged to be the Packers National bank of South Omaha, the amount as set forth being \$22,000.
