### RAILROAD NOTES.

The train schedule on the North River branch was changed last week, the arrival of the afternoon train being one hour earlier.

The terminal improvements for the North River branch at Gering will be a round house, coal chute and a depot 24 x 72 feet.

Track laying on the extension of the North River branch from Northport to Gering will begin this week. The grade has been completed to a point where the road crosses the river.

W. T. Price, claim adjuster from Union Pacific headquarters at Omaha, was in the city Saturday and Sunday checking up the damage from the wreck west of town.

While at work Saturday evening about a boiler, a scale of rust, uncomfortably hot, struck Pat Roddy in the eye causing him no little pain until it was extracted. Engineer Tom Gutherless had a similar experience the same evening with a cinder. Both men returned to work and suffered no serious consequences.

At Grand Island Thursday evening L. W. Rollins, the oldest living Union Pacific engineer, was presented with an honorary badge. This badge is an emblem of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers and entitles him to an honorary seat in the grand international division, and is the first of the kind ever presented in this state. In the party who called on Mr. Rollins and made the presentation were members of the Omaha and North Platte divisions of the B. of L. E., and the presentation speech was made by J. H. Fonda of this city.

### Parochial School Commencement.

The commencement exercises at St. Patrick's school were held Friday afternoon in the school building, and were a source of much interest and gratification alike to the parents and the faculty. The graduating class who have finished their work as far as the 8th grade consisted of five members, Katherine Herrod, Frances O'Neil, Marie Schatz, Leo Tighe and John Boyle, and their work reflects much credit on the Dominican Sisters who have charge of the school. The work of the pupils of the different grades in penmanship, map drawing, book-keeping, painting, embroidery and in fact all studies, have been on exhibition the past two days and are truly a credit to any school. The Palmer system of penmanship is the one taught at this school, and many of the papers show a most remarkable improvement for six months study. It is hoped that Sister Imelda and her efficient staff of assistants, who leave shortly for the summer vacation in Kentucky, will be returned here at the opening of the next term in September.

### Eight Grade Exercises.

County Supt. Ebricht says that they were kept so busy Friday with the Eight Grade examination that checking was not completed so that the exact number in attendance could not be stated, but that more than 200 were there, all of whom have declared intentions for ninth grade work next year. A splendid program was rendered and with exception of a song by the eight graders of North Platte was carried out as planned. The assembly room at the high school was crowded to the doors and everyone fully enjoyed the fine exercises.

The eight grade exercises are something entirely new in this county and has proven so good and so successful that it will be followed up with similar exercises in the future. The participants were: Archie Calligan, Dist. 29, rural school; Bert Hunter, central school; Marie Bowen, Lincoln school and Arthur McCabe of Washington school. ### Postal Savings Bank in Operation.

The postal savings department of the local postoffice was put into operation last Thursday, and that it is meeting with public approval and encouragement is proven by the fact that on the first day of its establishment the deposits amounted to \$138. To date, the fourth day of the new departure the deposits have reached the gratifying sum of \$345. Quite a number of these deposits were made by children, some of whom are under eleven years of age. Besides the deposits many cards designed especially for the encouragement of small savings, have been sold by the local office. These cards resemble somewhat a post card bearing a ten cent stamp and are checked with nine other squares for stamps. The cards are sold for ten cents and when a card has been filled with the ten stamps of same denomination they are returned to the postoffice, cancelled, and an account established for \$1.00, the amount required or specified by the government.

Postmaster Davis stated that he is particularly desirous and anxious that many more of these cards be taken as the whole object and intention of the system is to inculcate in the children a habit of saving and thrift which habit once formed is a sure foundation of success.

The progress so far established is a better record than by any postal savings bank in the state for a like period and we hope that every boy or girl in North Platte will "get the habit" and begin to lay the foundation for an independent life by converting their pennies into these stamps and place them where they can't get away from them.

One young lad not yet eleven years of age, made application at the local office for some U. S. government bonds, and other youngsters should follow his splendid example. These bonds are issued in denominations of \$20, \$40, \$60, \$80 and \$100, bearing 2 1/2 per cent interest and are not subject to taxation. Application for these bonds must be made before July 1st.

At York, Neb., June 13th, 14th and 15th, the postmasters of the state will hold a convention, and the postmasters who had some experience with the postal savings banks will tell their brother postmasters all about how it works, and they expect to have an interesting and instructive meet down there. Postmaster Davis is going and he will be prepared to give his brothers some facts and figures that will awaken new interest in the system.
