Welcome Home, Buffalo Bill. North Platte is justly proud of the Hon. Wm. F. Cody, though there are more here who know him as plain Bill— he has done much for North Platte and this city with its loyalty and never tiring devotion has done much to spur the great old scout to bigger and better things through a life covering nearly a half century and which has spread its efforts over the entire civilized world. Buffalo Bill created right here in our midst the greatest amusement enterprise this of any other country has ever known or ever will know. It was here on the site of the Cody homestead in 1892 that Bill Cody conceived the idea of a Wild West, one that was to carry its message of peace and progress to the fathermost corners of the world, one that was to gain international repute for its author and his loved town, one that was to carry the banner of North Platte and its fame to every man, woman and child of every nation.

There have been imitators of the wild west, there have been Frontier Days, there have been Mountains and Plains celebrations, there have been a dozen other ventures of a kindred nature but to Buffalo Bill Cody and the good old town of North Platte all credit is due, and the world at large knows this and is generous in giving praise where it belongs.

Col. Cody has toured the world, he has been showered with every honor that America and Europe can give to a distinguished man and now he is on the home ward stretch; he is paying his farewell visit to us in the saddle on August 19th. The old days have passed, time has ebbed him near the shore of well deserved rest and at the conclusion of his farewell Buffalo Bill will never again be seen in the saddle. What more fitting tribute could he pay to the city that saw his inception than to bring his Wild West here for a final engagement, to pitch a mammoth aerage of tents on the same ground that nearly thirty years ago saw his first efforts, where he began a career as a showman and an educator that has resulted in the most gigantic undertaking ever conceived and successfully put into execution.

Buffalo Bill will bid you good bye in person; he wants to gather just once more with those of the old time friends that are left. He wants to shake hands for the last time and tell you he has tried to carry the message well and honorably, that his mission is about accomplished, that he will soon be with you again but next time without the trappings of Buffalo Bill, just merely the man, one that is loved the world over, the honorable William F. Cody.

Boy Scouts, Attention. Troop No. 1 of the Boy Scouts of America is being formed in North Platte. The aim is to enlist every boy in town, if possible, between the ages of 12 and 18 years, in this greatest movement among boys which has ever been devised. The object is to show boys how to enjoy the outdoors, to train them in the principals of true manhood, self-reliance, self-control, and to help others in some way every day. The boys are taught first aid to the injured, life saving, tracking, signaling, woodcraft, and how to observe. Games have been arranged which bring out all these things. It is peace-scouting which these boys engage in, living as much out of doors as possible; camping, tracking, and learning the secrets of the woods and fields. It is not military but teaches the discipline and observation necessary to make real volunteers in time of need, and real men all the time. It is not religious, except in the way of teaching boys clean personal habits, to be honest, thrifty, and to do good turn every day. Scouts are either Tenderfoot, 2nd class, or First Class Scouts, and all must begin at the beginning. The motto of the Boy Scouts is "Be Prepared." The great American Naturalist, Mr. Ernest Thompson Seton is the Chief Scout in the United States, and the movement is growing rapidly in number and interest. In Nebraska the poll stood seventy-eight for reciprocity and sixty against. Whether the feeling among the voters outside of newspaper offices is relative can only be surmised, but the poll as a whole may be taken as a "straw" showing that the wind is blowing in the president's direction.—Kearney Hub.
