The Nebraska Publicity League is the name of a new organization that has for its object: "To advertise the agricultural, commercial and educational interests, advantages and opportunities of Nebraska, stimulate immigration and the investment of capital within the bounds of Nebraska, and further the collection and dissemination of complete and reliable statistics showing the resources and products of Nebraska."

The United States civil service commission announces the following examinations to be held at Lincoln, Norfolk, Grand Island, North Platte and Omaha: July 1--Quarry technologist (male) bureau of mines. July 5--Laboratory aid (male), bureau of plant industry, department of agriculture. July 8--Assistant agriculturist (male) office of farm management, bureau of plant industry; entomological draftsman, department of agriculture; horticulturist (male), bureau of plant industry department of agriculture. These examinations are open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements.

Last year when the Cross Country Club of the Y. M. C. A. association contracted with the Skougard concert party to appear here, it was agreed by the manager of the party that if the association did not meet the expense he would make good the deficit.
