Ordinance No. 3.

AN ORDINANCE.

To provide for the erection of a city hall in the City of North Platte, to accommodate the city officers and records, the fire department, fire apparatuses and police department.

Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of North Platte:

Section 1. That the city of North Platte, by and through the mayor and city council of said city of North Platte be and it is hereby authorized to erect a city hall in said city of North Platte, to accommodate the city officers and records, the fire department and fire apparatuses, and police department of said city, and to submit to the electors of said city the question: "Shall said city of North Platte borrow \$15,000.00 upon the negotiable bonds of said city, when petitioned so to do by ten per cent of the legal voters of said city, in manner provided by law?"

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, according to law.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance granting to the Nebraska Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, right of way for the maintenance of poles, wires, underground conduits and appurtenances thereto, through, upon, over and under the streets and alleys of the city of North Platte, Nebraska; regulating the erection and construction of poles, wires, and conduits and protecting the same in said city of North Platte.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That the Nebraska Telephone Company, its successors and assigns, be and hereby are granted the right of way for the construction, erection and maintenance of poles, wires, and conduits and all appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of transacting business through, upon, over and under the streets and alleys of the city of North Platte, by a written, acceptance signed by the proper officers of said company and filed with the city clerk at all times when requested by the Mayor and city council of said city of North Platte, permit their poles and fixtures to be used for the purpose of placing and maintaining thereon, free of charge, any wires which may be necessary for the use of the police or fire department of the city of North Platte, and provided further that such poles, wires, and conduits shall be constructed and erected so as not to interfere with the ordinary travel through said streets and alleys or with the water and gas mains or sewer laterals.

Section 2. That said Nebraska Telephone Company shall be confined in their erection and maintenance of poles, wires and conduits, to the alleys and restricted from the use of the streets as far as is possible in the proper construction of a cable telephone plant, and that the placing of said poles and wires shall be under the direct supervision of the Street Commissioner, and the committee on streets and sidewalks of the City of North Platte.

Section 3. That the said Nebraska Telephone Company, its successors or assigns, shall accept this ordinance within thirty days after the signing of the same by the Mayor and Clerk of said city of North Platte, by a written, acceptance signed by the proper officers of said company and filed with the city clerk and shall commence the construction in the said city of North Platte, of its new cable, central energy metallic service telephone exchange within six months after the acceptance of this franchise by the said company, and shall complete and have the same in operation within one year thereafter.

That any violation of any of the provisions of this section or the failure to comply with any of its conditions shall annul all the privileges under this franchise and this franchise shall become void and of no effect.

Section 4. That the provisions of this said ordinance and the privileges acquired thereunder shall be subject to regulation under the police power of the said city of North Platte.

Section 5. Any person who shall interfere with, cut, injure, remove, break or destroy any of the poles, wires, fixtures, instruments or other property of the said Telephone Company, or its successors or assigns, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than \$100.00; and any person who will paste, tack or fasten on the poles or fixtures of said company any sign, poster, advertisement, or banner, or hitch horses, mules, or cattle thereto, shall be fined in any sum not more than ten dollars.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect after its passage, approval and publication according to law, and the rights and provisions herein granted shall continue in force for a period of twenty-five years from and after the passage and approval of the ordinance.
